The council met at the Township Hall, Rocklyn, on Friday May 13th. All members present, the Reeve in the chair. Minutes of last meeting read and confirmed.

Murphy — Hutchinson — That the treasurer receive from R. A. Rennie the sum of \$100 proceeds of tree sold from 11th line.—Carried.

Rennie — Johnston — That the reeve and the clerk be a committee to go over the roll.—Carried.

Rennie — Murphy — That Sam Doherty be required to certify to the amount of wood supplied in each Division to the commissioner in charge.—Carried.

Rennie — Johnston — That Willard be appointed to run the grader in the westerly part of the Township and that he receive \$1.00 for each day of 10 hours.—Carried.

Hutchinson — Murphy — That Wm. Walters be appointed to run the grader in the easterly part of the township and that he receive \$2.00 per day of 10 hours.—Carried.

Johnston — Murphy — That the application of the trustees of School Section No. 3 asking the council to issue \$4,800 of Debentures for the erection of a new school payable in Twenty years at 4% per cent be granted, and that the clerk prepare a Bylaw accordingly.—Carried.

Hutchinson — Murphy — That the petition of John Haynes and five others asking that lot 11 and 1/2 of 12 be detached from School Section No. 7 and attached to No. 3 be granted.—Carried.
