The Markdale Fire Brigade under the captaincy of Mr. Carman King, had their first practice on Monday evening, and considering that this was their first and all the hands being new at the job, they made fairly good time. ## Death of Richard Milsap

Mr. Richard Milsap, formerly of Glenelg, but for nearly nine years a resident of Owen Sound, died on Sunday last. He had been failing in health for over a year, and for some two months was quite reduced in vitality from what developed into tumor of the kidneys, yet his condition was not considered critical until within a few days of the end. He decided on Saturday to go to the General and Marine Hospital, where his case was diagnosed and the physicians found it too late to help him as he was already sinking, and he passed peacefully away shortly after the consultation. His brother, W. J. and wife, arrived from Toronto on Saturday and were with him during his last hours, together with his two children, Alma and Willie, aged 15 and 17 years respectively, and the following p.m. together with Rev. T. A. Rodgers, his pastor, accompanied the body to Markdale and from the train the casket was followed to the Presbyterian Church by a large company of friends and sympathizers where an appropriate service was held, conducted by Rev. Mr. Rodgers, after which the remains were laid away beside those of his wife who predeceased him 11 years. The pall bearers were Messrs. Will Wilson, F. J. Ritchie, J. B. Thibaudan, A. L. Walker, J.
