To Prevent Smut.

The splendid crop of fall wheat just harvested is said to be the best on record. Some grists have already been brought to the mill, and the miller finds that owing to the prevalence of smut much of the grain, though very plump, is absolutely unfit to make flour. This is to be regretted. A large acreage of fall wheat will be sown within a few weeks and every farmer should prepare his seed by sprinkling with a liquid of vitrol, or Formaldehyde, perhaps better known as Formalin. It is said that 25 cents worth of the latter will treat enough seed for ten acres. By all means treat the seed so as to prevent this destructive fungus.
