

In the usual absence of the pastor on Sunday night last the pulpit in the Methodist Church was

Mr. Wm. Best, sr., a former resident of our burg, but now of Woodstock, was a pleasant visitor in our burg during the past week.

Despite his four score and two years, the venerable old gentleman is as hale and hearty as a ten-year-old.

The waterworks system that is being installed by some of our enterprising citizens is progressing rather slowly at present on account of

the great scarcity of men, however, the main pipe has been laid from the spring to Main street and the water is now coming down and all the citizens are privileged to use it pending the completion of system.

Dr. Bibby, of Flesherton, pronounces the water first class. The water, from the spring which is situated on the side of the mountain some 300 ft. or more higher than the village, is conveyed into a cement tank a short distance away, the capacity of which is at least 1000 bbls. From the tank it is conveyed into a three inch pipe for a short distance and finally into a 1/2 inch pipe which conveys it to the village.

The capacity of the spring is 5400 gals. every 10 hrs., which needless to say will furnish the entire village with an abundant supply of pure water.
