A hundred and sixty thousand immigrants came to Canada in the months of the calendar year ending June 30. The final figures are yet ready at the department, but the above is the approximate total. Of this number, the proportion is about 40,000 Americans, and 60 British and Continental.

This year there are 1,660 new bakers in the Province of Ontario. The rate of supply, if kept up for a year or more years, it is thought that to remedy the shortage that has been felt for some time, despite the influx to the west. In a recent interview the Minister of Education said strongly the necessity of giving salaries of qualified teachers, etc., to be kept in Ontario.

The Canadian Pacific Railway has just completed a census of its employees resident in Montreal. The total number of the company's employees is 11,092. A large number of these are unmarried, and so the usual census calculation of five persons per family would be excessive, but a fair average of those dependent upon each wage-earner would probably be in the neighborhood of three, making the total number of persons dependent upon the C. P. R. pay-rolls between 30,000 and 35,000.

On the usual basis of calculation about seven thousand people, butchers, bakers, shopkeepers, physicians, teachers, etc., make a living by attending to the wants of these people, so that it may fairly be computed that upwards of 40,000 people live in Montreal because of the Canadian Pacific's stay to be kept in Ontario.

It is estimated that the average earning per head of those employed is in the neighborhood of \$3 per day, making the daily distribution about \$3,000, or at the rate of about \$12,000,000 per year.

Great Electrical Storm

Sweeps Over Section North of Markdale.—W. H. Muxlow, Goring, Killed by Lightning.

On Wednesday afternoon, last Grey County was visited by one of the most severe electrical storms that has ever occurred in this section of the Province. While Markdale and its immediate vicinity seemed to escape damage by the lightning, the storm seemed to centralize in the section north of Markdale, and great loss of property is reported in the townships of Holland and Sullivan.

The most serious result of the storm, however, was the fatality in Euphrasia, when William Henry Muxlow, a prosperous farmer, son of Mr. Thomas Muxlow, of Markdale, was struck by a bolt of lightning and instantly killed. Only last spring Mr. Muxlow lost his residence by fire, and it was while at work on the construction of his new house, that he lost his life.

Mr. Muxlow was near one of the windows watching the storm when the bolt of lightning came. Death was instantaneous, and the hired man, Bruce Trickey, who was helping him in the house, was stunned, but soon recovered. Mr. Muxlow is well known and highly esteemed throughout this section of the country and was a most successful farmer. His farm is situated on the 11th con. of Euphrasia, between Goring and Walters Falls. Deceased leaves a wife and one child, a boy of eight. He is also survived by two sisters, Mrs. George H. Myers, 466 Seventh Avenue E., Owen Sound; and Miss Emma Muxlow, Toronto; three brothers, John, implement agent in Meaford; Jos., of Walters Falls; and George, in the Canadian West; and his father, Mr. Thomas Muxlow, Markdale.

In Chatsworth vicinity two barns were struck by lightning and completely destroyed, also the valuable barn and contents belonging to Mr. John S. Cameron, of Arnott.

Mr. Geo. Robson, of Massie, and Mr. Philip Corbett, of Williamsburg, suffered the loss of their fine barns.
