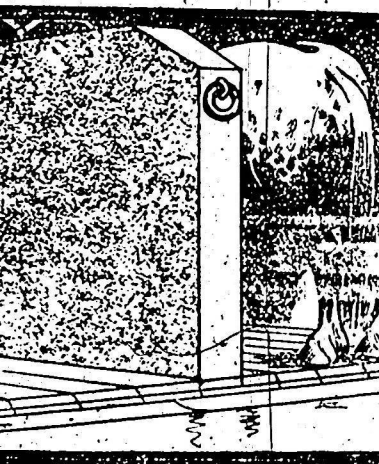

EXPORT HEMLOCK BARK
Prohibitory Regulation in Abeyance for a Year.
By an order-in-council the prohibitory regulation against the exportation of hemlock bark from Ont. stands in abeyance till Aug. 31st, 1911. This recent order of the Provincial Government will be officially published in the Ontario Gazette on Monday.

Alfred Robertson, sergeant of the Toronto Fire Brigade, shot himself through the head while on duty on the C.P.R. train from Ottawa, as it neared Toronto on Saturday morning, dying a few minutes afterwards and before the train pulled in at the Union Station. While in Toronto he was a member of the Queen's Own Rifles and the 88th Highlanders, and was drum major of the latter for some time. He was a big, strapping man, standing about 6 feet 6 inches, and was built in proportion. He was on his way to Toronto for his holidays.

Mrs. Ann Holt, of St. John's, B., died at the age of 107. Her sons, one daughter, five grandchildren and sixteen great-grandchildren survive her.
