constructed and properly planned; how furnished? the furnishings are very suitable; condition and adequacy of the halls, rooms and dormitories. Describe fully--every part is inspected and found clean and in excellent order; condition and adequacy of quarters occupied by staff and employees, satisfactory; condition and adequacy of dining-room and its equipment, satisfactory; condition and adequacy of kitchen and its equipment, satisfactory; condition and adequacy of the laundry and its equipment, satisfactory; condition and adequacy of the system of heating, lighting, ventilation, water supply and sewage disposal, hot water heating, electric light, direct ventilation, water supply from spring on farm, drainage satisfactory.

FIRE PROTECTION.

Number of storeys in building and facilities for escape, 3; very fair facilities for escape; number and location of interior stairways, 3 to each flat, centre and ends; number and location of fire escapes--2, one at each end of building; is there a stand pipe with hose in good condition attached thereto? yes; what other provision for fire protection? water on each flat; organization and practice of fire drills, no; is there a night watch regularly employed? no; presence of rubbish in attic or cellars--none found; are inmates allowed matches? Yes.

DIETARY.

Is the dietary suitable, and is it prepared and served in a proper manner? The food provided is

wholesome and very suitable. It is properly prepared and served. How are the supplies furnished? By contract and open purchase.

CARE OF THE INMATES.

Average number of inmates during year, 39; average net cost weekly per inmate, \$1.90; is there a proper separation of sexes? yes; are any of the inmates insane? slightly disturbed; are there any children among the inmates? no; are any in restraint or seclusion? no; are the inmates comfortably clothed? yes; appearance of the inmates, comfortable; condition of bedding and clothing, clean and suitable; are the beds kept clean and free from vermin? yes; are the inmates bathed regularly? yes, weekly; have any of the inmates (tubercular disease? no; if so, what means are taken to isolate and prevent spread of disease?

SALARIES OF OFFICIALS.

Superintendent, \$400; matron, \$300; physician, \$300; nurse, none; farmer, \$275; cook, \$12 per month; maids, \$8 per month; other salaries, none.

THE RECORDS.

Describe the manner in which the records are kept, and by whom? Correctly by Superintendent. Is there a proper register kept? Yes. Is a careful record kept of the disposition of all supplies? Yes. Is there a regular stock book kept? Yes. Special features observed at inspection in regard to discipline and management.--My inspection impressed me most favorably in regard to the manner in which this House of Refuge is conducted. Every room was found clean and apparently well looked after. The new ice and coal house has been completed since my last visit,

and is very satisfactory; also a new bridge across the river.

NEEDS AND RECOMMENDATIONS.

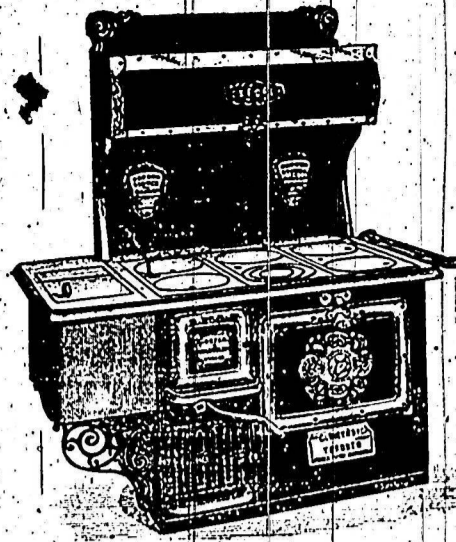
