Fine Exhibits at Markdale Fair

Especially in Live Stock.—Rain Decreased Attendance.—Races Will Be Held This Thursday.

The weather man treated the Directors of the Markdale Agricultural Society to very bad weather for their annual Fall Exhibition last week. It rained and again it rained, and that's all there's to it.

Had the weather been fine, as it was during the latter part of the week, the Directors' hearts undoubtedly would have been cheered with the largest crowd ever. As it was, though, the number of entries were not quite up to last year's record. The show was an excellent one in every department—the exhibits being all of an unusually high class—and all the departments were well filled.

The parade of the school children was one of the most interesting features of the day. Nearly 400 boys and girls were in line. Being plentifully supplied with flags waved their flags and hurrahs, and lustily—the noise being in inverse ratio, the smaller, the 'boy' the greater the noise. Principal Rowe marshalled the procession and much credit is due to him for this successful feature of the day's programme.

The show of horses was—in the opinion of those qualified to state—an excellent one. There were all kinds and ages from the heavy Clyde teams to the ponies.

The Cattle too were much in evidence, and many a thoroughbred drew favorable comments from those who knew a good animal when they see one. As usual Mr. Thomas Mercer's stock displayed many red cards.

The Poultry display was unusually good and the roosters had reasons for crowing—at least they crowed, anyway.

The display on view in the tent did not appear to be as good advantage apparently as in previous years. However, there was the usual show of fancy work, fruit, vegetables and dairy products. The roots generally were above the average—the potatoes and the carrots being exceptionally fine.

Of course the rain spoiled the track so that the races were declared off. However, the Directors generously issued passes to those who desired to see the horse races on Thursday of this week. This action on the part of the Directors is commendable and it is to be hoped that the public generally will patronize "The Sport of Kings" on Thursday so that the management of the Driving Club will not suffer much financially on account of their generosity.

There was a general desire on the part of the citizens to decorate their buildings, the business section of the town being quite gay with flags and bunting.

Much favorable comment was heard on the general behavior of the crowd. There were few if any drunks on the streets and the frequent Fair disturbance is becoming a thing of the past.

Much of the success of the Exhibition is due to the indefatigable efforts of the enterprising Secretary, Reeve Jackson. He has given the exhibition much attention and has made a success of it, as he does
