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

Gaol Statistics For Past Year

Small Increase in Number of Prisoners.—No Serious Crimes Committed in the County.

A great deal of interesting information is contained in Governor J. Miller's report of the doings at the County Gaol during the twelve months ending September 30th. Some of it is not over-encouraging to those who believe that the world is growing better, for it appears that in the section of the globe known as the County of Grey more persons were committed to gaol and more sentenced to imprisonment than during the preceding twelve months. The increase in commitments is small—134 against 123 for the year 1909—but the number sentenced is increased from 69 to 90. Acquittals number 36 for 1909, and 31 for 1910; this year one was released on suspended sentence, against five last year.

Of those sentenced, 75—including one woman—were sent direct to gaol, two to Reformatory for boys, nine to Central Prison, and five women to the Mercer Reformatory. All were sentenced for terms less than two years. Thirty-nine went down for less than a month, 15 for periods between two and six months, four—two men and two women—for terms over six months and less than a year, and 8—5 men and 3 women—for more than one year and less than two.

None of the crimes or offences committed seem to have been serious. The "cash system" at the local police court may account to some extent for the fact that while in 1909 there were 15 "drunks" committed to gaol, and 13 sentenced, the numbers for 1910 are respectfully 41 and 31. A great improvement is noticed in regard to theft, for in 1909 for that crime 34 were committed and 29 sentenced while in 1910, the commitments numbered only 15 and the sentences 9. Housebreaking, however, shows an increase, from 1 in 1909 to 6 in 1910. The "Vag" is still with us, as shown by 23 commitments and 17 sentences in 1909 and 24 and 19 this year.

The prisoners are classified according to their religious denominations. From the record it would appear that the Presbyterians are going bad entirely, for their representation has increased from 25 to 42. The Anglicans on the other hand have decreased from 35 to 29.

Messrs. Geo. and David Bates, of Niagara Falls, visited with their sister, Mrs. Thomas Coopen, for a few days last week. They also met many old friends at the fair in Feversham, the village of their boyhood days.

A sad fatality occurred near Maxwell on Saturday morning last when Mr. John Kerton one of Osprey's pioneers, was found lying dead on his farm a short distance from the village. and the Methodists also show same improvement, with a drop from 29 to 25. Roman Catholics, with 16 each year, have neither gained or lost.

One hundred and one or more than seventy-five per cent—are classed as temperate, and only thirty-three as intemperate. Twenty can neither read nor write. Ninety-five were married and thirty-nine single—a startling change from 1909, when the figures were respectively 39 and 84.

Apart from the matter contained in it, the report is interesting from the fact that it is Governor Miller's forty-eighth report. It is quite safe to say that he is the oldest gaol governor in the Province—not in years, but in term of office. In two years he will be able to celebrate his golden anniversary; and from all appearance he will be able to celebrate many after that. And the Inspector's report shows that he is also one of the best in the business, for it gives the highest praise to the way in which the gaol is conducted.—Sun.

Alliston Drayman Objected to Search

Constable Holmes has undertaken to have legal option enforced in Alliston to the letter and has been keeping an eye on express and freight coming into town, in the hope of finding out where the liquid refreshments are coming from and where they are going after their arrival here. On Tuesday morning the constable spied a conspicuous looking box that looked to him like a case of whiskey at the Grand Trunk Station. The box was in transit as express in charge of the Canadian Express Co. and when Constable Holmes undertook to seize the supposed wet goods, the local agent of the Express Company, Mr. B. Holland, put up a pretty stiff defence, so much so that the seizure did not take place. The constable claims he had a right to seize the liquor and has lodged a charge of obstructing a constable in charge of his duty. The case will come up in the police court.
