Miss M. Leslie attended the teachers' convention in Dundalk last week.

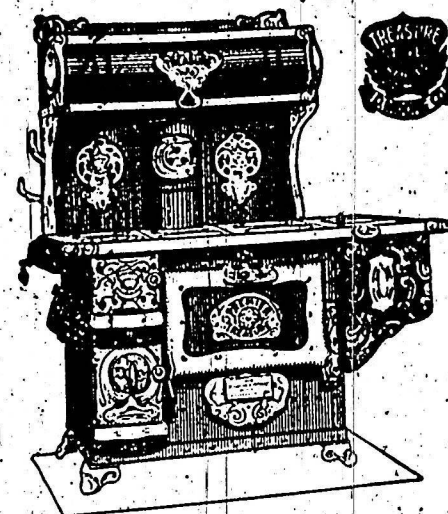
