Bridge Was Not Ready

Pricéville Girl Injured at Crossing Ordered to be Protected.

While driving home from Flesheron last week Miss Lizzie Mathers, the 18 year old daughter of the late Mr. John Mathers, Proton town line, met with a terrible accident at the railway crossing near Priceville where her horse became unmanageable and collided with a passing freight train. A fracture of the shoulder was sustained and one limb so injured that amputation above the ankle was necessary. The patient, for whom much sympathy is felt, is, we learn, in a critical condition. The horse escaped injury, but the buggy was smashed to pieces.

The crossing is a dangerous one, and the Railway Commission had ordered the Company to erect an overhead bridge by July 31st. The bridge has just been completed, but no work has been done on the approaches.

Markdale Council.

The regular meeting of the Municipal Council of Markdale met in regular session on Monday. All the members were present. After the minutes of previous meeting had been confirmed, salaries and miscellaneous accounts, totalling \$95.05, and Water Works bills, amounting to \$122.76, were passed and ordered to be paid. It was decided that in future all accounts against the corporation were to be handed to the Chairman of the different departments to be certified to at least three days previous to the regular meeting of Council, otherwise accounts not so handed in are liable to be left over until following meeting, one month hence. This is to expediate business at the Council table.

Collector Reed handed in his bond properly executed and intimated that he will soon make his annual call on the tax payers. C. W. Rutledge, of The Standard Printing Co., appeared before the Council in reference to water for their motor. He said the pressure was not sufficient to work their large press. He intimated his willingness to pay any reasonable toll assessed by the Council. It was decided to charge an annual rate of \$30.00.

The Reeve and Clerk were instructed to sign an agreement with the C.P.R. for right of way for telephone wires over C.P.R. tracks. By-law 224 closing parts of Scotland and Lorne streets and leasing same to Orr Minnis Esq. for a term of 10 years was given its three readings and signed by Reeve and Clerk.

By-law 225 appointing an Inspector of slaughter houses and dairies was passed through its various stages, as also was By-law No. 226, appointing Dr. Oliver Inspector for balance of current year. Adjournment was made until next regular meeting, Nov. 28th.

W. S. Chalmers arrived from Saskatoon, Sask., on Friday last, looking hale and hearty. Mr. Chalmers reports having had a successful summer. Crops in the west are much better than reported some time ago, as threshing results show. When the western farmer realizes that better cultivation of the soil means bigger and better crops, he will be surprised at the increased yield, even in a dry season, and when the thousands of acres yet unbroken are taken up by industrious farmers annually pouring into the west, our present railway facilities though rapidly increasing will be inadequate to handle the output of the three prairie provinces, Saskatchewan alone producing over sixty millions of wheat this year.

Of Importance to Farmers Regarding the Preparing of Poultry for Market.

The following instructions should be strictly observed so that the best market prices shall be at your command for your Poultry when marketing:

- 1st—All poultry must be dry, picked and plucked clean.
- 2nd—No feathers of any kind, wing or tail, should be left on.
- 3rd—Heads must be taken off all kinds of poultry.
- 4th—Poultry requires to be starved at least 24 hours so that nothing remains in their crops.
- 5th—Under no consideration should poultry be scalded, as it lowers the market value of poultry 3 to 5c. lb.

The above instructions strictly followed will always insure the marketing of poultry at good prices.
