Crippen Found Guilty of Murder

Sentenced To Be Hanged on Nov. 8th for the Murder of His Wife.

London, Oct. 22nd.—Dr. Hawley Harvey Crippen was found guilty to-day of the murder of his wife, Belle Elmore Crippen. The jury was out twenty-nine minutes, having retired at 2:17.

Crippen's conviction followed an impassioned appeal by King's Counsel R. D. Muir, in his closing address for the prosecution, and instructions by presiding Judge Lord Alverstone that were considered unusually favorable to the prosecution.

Crippen received the verdict with a fair show of composure, as the speech of Muir and the instructions of the court had evidently prepared him for the worst. The verdict was read amid an almost oppressive silence, after Lord Alverstone had warned those in the courtroom against any demonstration.

Lord Alverstone, donning the black cap, passed the sentence of death upon Crippen. This was the only sentence possible under the verdict, but there is a chance that this sentence will be commuted to life imprisonment, owing to the circumstantial nature of the case against the accused.

STORY IN BRIEF OF WORLD FAMOUS CASE.

January 31—Dr. Crippen and his wife, Belle Elmore, gave a dinner party, and apparently were on the best of terms.

Feb. 2—Belle Elmore resigned by letter as treasurer of Music Hall Ladies' Guild, saying she was going to California to see sick relative.

March 22—Advertisement of Belle Elmore's sudden death in California printed in London newspapers.

July 8—Friends of Mrs. Crippen

tell Scuttell Yard they believe she has been murdered.

July 9—Crippen tells Inspector Dew his wife is not dead, but they have agreed to separate.

July 11—Dr. Crippen and his ty-

pist, Ethel Clare Leneve, disappear.

July 13—Body found in cellar of Crippen's home.

July 23—Capt. Kendall of steamer Montrose reports to Scotland Yard. Crippen and Leneve passengers bound for Canada.

July 31—Inspector Dew, disguised as pilot, boards Montrose, and arrests Crippen and Leneve.

Aug. 20—Party return to England.

Oct. 18—Trial of Dr. Crippen on charge of wilful murder begun.

Oct. 22—Found guilty and sentenced to hang.
