Remarkable Growth of Winnipeg City

Some New and Marvellous Facts Regarding This Wonderful Gateway City of the West.

(Bowmanville Statesman.)

One can write so much about Winnipeg that it is not easy to make a start. This journal has contained many articles about the city so we must present some new features and revise some old ones. From the latest information available we shall present some startling figures. They startled us and we fancy they will surprise our readers. We know figures are dry reading, but those we shall give are anything but dull reading for they show a greater object lesson in civic growth than has ever been witnessed this side of Manitoba.

Wonderful Gateway City! Still growing marvellously. Building records and bank clearings mark its present material and business growth. For nine months of 1910 the building permits taken out have reached over thirteen millions of dollars. Bank clearings figures for same period reach \$621,213,673.00 or over 50 per cent. greater than the record of last year for the first nine months. Population grows also by thousands yearly! Just think that in 1870, only 40 years ago, it had 215 people living there—today about 150,000; then a Hudson Bay trading post, today the fourth city in Canada, the second manufacturing centre, the third wholesale distributing point in the Dominion and the greatest grain market in the British Empire. Within one decade the assessed value of property has increased from \$25,077,400 in 1900 to \$157,608,220 in 1910. Its tax rate is 10.8 mills. In the past 7 1/2 years building permits have totalled \$68,000,000. What city in Christendom can show such a record?

Winnipeg stands as the chief gateway to the world's greatest wheatfields—a living evidence to the wonderful richness of the prairie soil as well as a magnificent monument to the spirit of progress. This startling statement has been published from returns compiled from boards of trade and grain dealing associations—Winnipeg is now the greatest actual wheat market on the North American Continent. "Winnipeg wheat receipts for the year ending 31st August, 1910, were 88,269,339 bus. Other cities for calendar year 1909 were: Minneapolis 81,111,410, Buffalo 61,084,797, Montreal 30,081,779, Chicago 26,985,112, New York 23,304,300. As an oat market Winnipeg stands second, Chicago heading the list of American markets. Winnipeg's actual oat receipts last year totalled 30,838,900 bushels, New York being third with 23,717,562 bushels."

Another statement that appears with the figures quoted above, showing that Western Canada is only beginning to grow crops, is that only 3 per cent. of arable land is yet under cultivation and Manitoba contains over 41 million acres, Saskatchewan over 155 millions, and Alberta 160,755,200 acres. The acreage in 1910 was: wheat 8,453,200 acres, oats 4,223,800, barley 1,

022,000, flax 630,000. A promise of what may be anticipated in future is given in the number of home-stead entries, which is increasing every year as follows: In 1907 there were 28,647; in 1908 the number was 30,424, and in 1909 the record number of 39,081; and figures for 1910 up to June 1 showed an increase over the same period in 1909 of 78 per cent. So 1910 will break all previous records. The rapid development of the country as indicated by the construction of railroad is keeping pace with the general march of progress, for in 1900 there were 3,680 miles of railway while in 1909 there were 11,472 miles.

Winnipeg's improvements have been advanced with the city's growth. We first visited it in July, 1882, when it was in size and character like an ordinary country town, with mud of the most tenacious quality abundant everywhere. To-day Winnipeg has broad asphalted business streets which stretch their lavish length across what was but a few years ago virgin prairie. Miles of boulevard and smoothly paved streets make up a residential section, favorably comparable with many of the best cities in the world. Splendid hotels, fine stores, banks plentiful in number and ample in their capacity to supply the financial needs of the city, wholesale houses thoroughly equipped to furnish the large mercantile territory to the west; excellent car service, colleges and a public school system that affords ample opportunities for education; public parks, libraries, in short all that goes to make up a well-organized and progressive city has been gathered together.

Winnipeg's size may also be judged in a sense by these figures: This city contains 122 churches and missions, 33 public schools with a registered attendance exceeding 15,000, and six parochial schools with 1200 pupils, six colleges, a university, provincial agricultural college, academies, ladies schools, the Provincial Government buildings, court house, gaols, chief offices of the Dominion Government, in the West, fine city hall, a Carnegie library—costing \$1,400,000—two railway depots, costing over \$1,000,000 each—erected recently—Industrial Exhibition buildings, extensive markets, fire stations and police stations and waterworks. The electric street railway operates 185 cars on 62 miles of city tracks and 44 miles of suburban lines.

Winnipeg city owns and operates its own asphalt paving plant, its own quarry, street lighting, water works—including high pressure fire system of 300 lb. pressure for fire protection. Winnipeg has decided for cheap power. On Winnipeg River a total of 60,000 h.p. is being developed, which is to be sold to consumers at prices that will compete with any city in Canada. The factory output is \$25,000,000 annually, an increase of over 300 per cent. in ten years. Over 15,000 factory hands now find employment in 175 successful plants operating. This record in industrial growth, the wholesale turnover of \$100,000,000 and the enormous grain trade handled in the city makes Winnipeg the Capital City of Commerce of Western Canada.
