Mr. Mann's Big Trout.

Weights 35½ Pounds.—Captured Last August at Pointe au Baril by Mr. Thos. Mann, of Markdale.

No doubt a number of our readers have read with a great deal of pleasure, also with some amazement, the wonderful fishing stories connected with the early Salmon industry on the Fraser River, when the Redmen were the masters of Western Canada, the Western plains were yet unblemished by the sound of war, and the Rocky Mountains were the haunts of the Grizzly Bear and the Grizzly Bear alone. The white man had not then placed his foot on the Great Pacific Slope. Salmon trout weighing in the neighborhood of 40 lbs. were said to have been caught there. We read of such things in "Tyrell's Wonderful Explorations," but near at home, not farther than Pointe au Baril, the summer home of Mr. R. L. Stephen, of Markdale, comes a more stupendous story. Mr. Thos. Mann, Markdale's grand old sport, who summered with Mr. Stephen, is the hero of this story.

On the 3rd of August, 1910, Mr. A. H. Stephen, Master Harold Armstrong, Mr. Mann and R. L. Stephen, accepted a kind invitation from Captain McGinnis, of the tug, "Elsie M.", to strike out on a fishing expedition. This tug leaves early—long before breakfast—daily to raise the nets staked some ten miles out in the bay. Upon reaching the fishing grounds the trolling lines were cast out. Mr. Mann had been trolling but a short time when he hooked something—so heavy was the pull that the fisher did not know whether he had connected with a coral reef or part of the long lost "Asia." However, taking a fresh grip on the line he began to steadily haul in. Everybody was on the "Qui vive." The fishermen came to his assistance with their gaffs ready. Perspiration stood out on Tom's forehead like marbles. Finally a beautiful salmon trout was landed, weighing 35½ pounds—the largest fresh water trout ever known to have been caught with a trolling hook in the Georgian Bay.

R. L. tells that in the excitement of the moment Mr. Mann's hat fell off, and in attempting to replace the same on his head, found that the letter had expanded so greatly that it was found impossible, and the enlargement of the band of the hat was found to be the only way out of the difficulty.
