### Beware of Swindlers.

Don't Deal With Unknown Parties.

Our readers should keep their weather eye open for fakirs and swindlers as they are numerous and work every scheme to catch people. The latest swindle worked by a sharper in one of the cities recently is an apt illustration of the ability of these dead beat fakirs to catch not only the ignorant, but all others who are not constantly on their guard. This swindler walked into a jewelry store and selecting a \$125 watch left a check for \$600 drawn on an out-of-town bank, with instructions that the watch be regulated and that he would come after it and his change a week later. On returning he was informed that his check was "no good." "Well, that's strange," he said, "It's the second time the bank has done that on me. But here's your money for your watch." He counted out \$125 in currency and started for the door. "Oh yes," he said, turning around, "you had better give me that check." It was willingly handed over to him. On the back was the jeweller's endorsement. With this the man went to the bank, got it cashed, and was never heard of afterwards.

### Changes in Liquor Act. Neighbors Bid Farewell.

An amendment was made to the Liquor License Act in the Provincial House on Tuesday, which provides that in cities a tax of 5 per cent. will be imposed on all bar receipts exceeding \$60 a day, and on \$50 in all other places.

As there are several contentious clauses in the Liquor License bill, it will be discussed again. One of these provides that no local option by-law shall be quashed or set aside on the ground only that a monopoly has been created by limitation of the number of licenses, and during the time the by-law is in force no greater number of licenses shall be issued. Inspectors are given the right to search hotels in local option districts, and the holder of a summary license shall not be required to petition for the license each year.

**ELECTORS TO DECIDE.**

In future the question of license reduction is to be taken out of the hands of Municipal Councils, and left with the electors. Ten per cent. of the electors may petition the council any time before the first of November, asking for a reduction in a certain number of the licenses. The question then must be voted on at the next municipal election, and submitted to a fifty per cent. vote. The submission of the question is compulsory, and if the by-law is carried by the electors the Council is compelled to give it its third reading so that it shall become law. After such a question has been decided upon by the electors, it cannot again be submitted to the people for three years. All local option votes shall be confined to resident voters.

Hon. Mr. Mackay thought some change should be made with regard to the sale of liquor to men on the "Indian list." Many men now, he said, got liquor while they were on the list, because the bartenders claimed that they did not know of the fact. He suggested that the question of knowledge be eliminated, and the judge be allowed to decide. This suggestion will be considered.
