

HAS A HUGE DIOCESE

"REV. OVIDE CHARLEBOIS' FIELD EXTENDS TO THE POLE.

Newly Appointed Vicar Apostolic of Keewatin Is an Energetic and Faithful 'Missionary-Has Spent 23 Years In the Mission Fields of the North-He Will Have Thirteen Priests to Assist Him.

Rev. Ovide Charlebois, O.M.I., who was consecrated vicar apostolic of Keewatin diocese, by Mgr. Langevin, O.M.I., archbishop of St. Boniface, at the parish church of the Assumption, near Montreal, a few days ago. is very well known in Hull, Quebec, and Ottawa. The consecration ceremony was a solemn function, three bishops, many priests, including two brothers of the new bishop, and a very large number of laity being present. Mgr. Charlebois is at present in Ottawa where he is expected to remain until the new year when he will proceed to his newly formed of the province of Saskatchewan and the territory north of the Saskatche-wan and Manitoba up to the Arctic Circle. He will have 13 Oblate Fathers to assist him in the work in this vast field. His labors in the nast have been very successful and his lordship is confident that with the help of Indian schools and his missionaries he will be able to do much

to solage the lot of the red men who live in that rugged district. Mgr. Ovide Charlebois was born in Ora, Quebec, in 1662, and belongs to one of the pionedr families in that province. His early education was obtained at Assumption College, Montreal! Novitiate of the Oblate Fathers at Lachine and was ordained to the priesthood in 1887. Two of his brothers also entered the priesthood, one being at present principal of the Ottawa East Scholastic and the other parish priest bi the Holy Family parish, Ottawa East. In 1887 Mgr. Charlebois was appointed to the mission field of the diocese of St. Albert. Five years later he arrived at St. Joseph Mission and for 16 years he labored in these wild regions of the north, for the most part making his own living whilst visiting and preaching to the people In recognition of his zeal he was placed at the head of all the neighboring missions in 1890, this giving him supervision of all the "lower" Saskatchewan, and each year he has traveled along the Saskatchewan and its tributaries by boat from Prince Abert looking after the Indians and carrying provisions to the different pists. In 1903 he became director of St. Michael's Indian School at Duck Lake which has, under his care, become one of the finest Indian schools of the west. When the new vicariate apostolic was formed, which includes all the territory watered by the tributaries of the Hudson Bay and extending to the North Pole, Mgr. Charlebois was selected as the first vicar apostolic.

A Laborer's Windfall. The story of a remarkable windfall comes from Bunby, near Glasgow, to the effect that a farm laborer named John McCluskey, has become heir to a huge fortune, said to exceed a quarter of a million pounds sterling. Some days ago an advertisement was published, offered a reward for information as to the whereabouts of John McCluskey, formerly of Annahilla, Tyrone. The other day a legal representative and a relation visited the farm and informed McCluskey (who was found working in a turnip field) that he was the heir to a huge fortune. In company with his two visitors, the laborer immediately proceeded to Glasgow to embark for New York. The money, it is stated, has been left by a brother of McCluskey's in the United States, with whom he had had no correspondence for twenty
