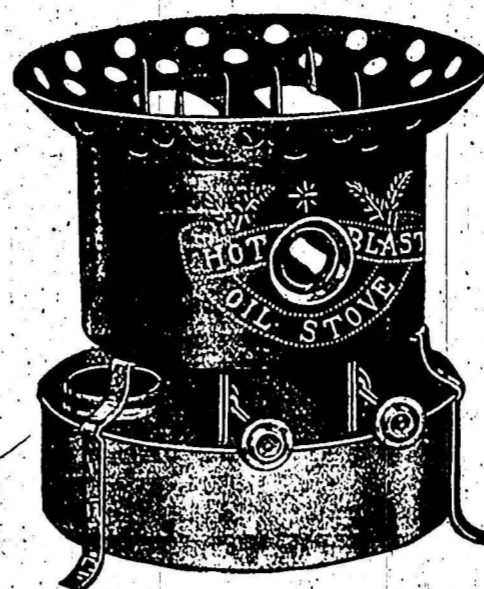

A Telephone Decision.

A decision has been made by the Ontario Railway and Municipal Board which is of interest in view of the rapid expansion of rural telephone systems. The Board decided not to approve any contract between local companies and the Bell Company which would prevent the local company from using, and transmitting messages from any other local telephone company with which it now connects or which it may in future connect. The Board will not approve of any agreement which will have the effect of preventing or restricting inter-communication, joint operation or reciprocal rights between telephone companies under its jurisdiction.

farm where he died. For about eleven seasons he followed sailing from Montreal northward, his time being spent mostly on Lake Huron and Georgian Bay. Mr. McRae was twice married, his first marriage taking place 44 years ago to Miss Christine Drummond, of Carlton Place, who died 37 years ago, leaving one son, Alex., who survives his parents on the home-stand. In 1878 he was again married to Mrs. William Muir, of Artemesia, who died at their home in Ceylon in April, 1910. An older brother, Mr. Daniel McRae, of Carlton Place, survives, though ill from a recent paralytic stroke. In politics Mr. McRae was a Liberal, and in religion a Presbyterian, a member of Chalmers' church, Flesherston, for many years. Mr. McRae, the late Donald McKenzie, and Mr. Alex. Stewart, of Flesherston, were boys together in Scotland, and for many years old neighbors here, but Mr. Stewart is now the lone surviving member of the trio.
