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Impressive Service in Christ Church

On Sunday last the Lord Bishop
of the Diocese administered the
Apostolic Rite of Confirmation to
fourteen persons in Christ Church,
four of whom were from St. Mat-
thias' Church, Berkeley. One con-
firmand was unable to be present on
account of sickness. The candi-
dates assembled in the vestry
and, led by the Rector, took their
places in the two front pews on
the north side of the church. At
eleven o'clock the choir, of twenty-
one voices, entered the front door
and marched up the aisle singing
"Onward, Christian Soldiers."
Then followed the Shortened Form
of Morning Prayer to the Third
Collect. The special Psalm available
chosen, and one most appropriate
to the occasion, was No. 34, and
the Bishop, which was read, the
Bishop, was Acts 8: 17, which
relates the first Christian confir-
mation administered by St. Peter
and St. John in Samaria. After
the 3rd Collect the hymn, "My
God, Accept My Heart This Repre-
sentative Day," was sung. Then
followed the sermon by His Lordship,
the subject being "The Qualifications
of the Christian Soldier." This
was a most instructive and help-
ful sermon and delivered in the
clear and forceful manner so char-
acteristic of the Bishop's utteran-
ces. Then was sung, "Come, Gra-
cious Spirit, Heavenly Dove,"
after which the Rector presented
the candidates and the Confirma-
tion service proper commenced, at
the conclusion of which the Bishop
called each candidate by name and
presented the certificate of confir-
mation. During the offertory a
Barnard's beautiful solo, "The
Shepherd of the Flock," the words
of which were most fitting to the
occasion, was sung by Mrs. Edg.
Dymond in her rich contralto voice.
The service closed with the
Recessional Hymn, "Fight the
Good Fight With All Thy Might,"
Miss Macpherson is to be congrat-
ulated upon the success of the
musical portion of the service. Her
prelude was "Berceuse" (Jacelyn)
by Godard, and while the congre-
gation was leaving the church
Miss Macpherson played the beau-
tiful "Marché" by Rosenkrantz. Al-
together the service was very suc-
cessful, and the congregation fully
taxed the seating capacity of the
church.

Representatives Will Go North

The district representatives of
the Ontario Department of Agri-
culture, situated in various parts
of the Province, are to make a
tour of inspection in Northern
Ontario the first week in August.
The party will consist of nineteen
representatives, together with Mr.
Putnam, Superintendent of the
