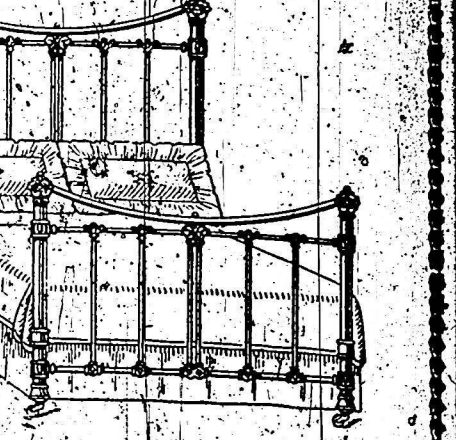

Light Train Wrecked.

C.P.R. at Murray's Curve, Near Owen Sound—No One Hurt.

Owen Sound, July 30.—An excessive freight train wreck occurred on C.P.R. at noon to-day. A train of forty-six cars with high freight for the west was dinged Murray's Curve as the train enters the town, when a gondola coal car left the rails and was followed by two box-cars filled with high freight. The track is in grade at the point, and on a slight embankment. The coal cars rolled a hundred yards before turning down the embankment. Box-cars turned crosswise and slid up side a mass of wreckage. The front section of the train, composed of twenty-three cars, on which were most of the crew, pulled into the yard. The engine of the wrecked train was pulled into the yard, and hauled back the cars on the rails, replacing others which were still on the ties, and Toronto auxiliary arrived this morning to pick up the balance of the wreckage. The track was dinged completely, some of the heavy 100-pound rails being bent fifty feet from their position. This is the first wreck to occur on what is known as Murray's Dump in its forty years' use of the railway.
