Almost Impossible To Shoot Rapids

Channel of the St. Lawrence Not So Low in Years.—Dangerous to Attempt to Run a Boat Through There Now.

(From Our Own Correspondent.)

Montreal, July 21.—Despite the fact that the Dominion Government has been spending millions in money and years in the bettering of the navigable channel of the St. Lawrence from the Great Lakes to the sea it is many moons since the inland shipping fleets have had such rough sledding as they have had this season. For sledding instead of sailing it has been on many an eventful occasion. The experienced pilots assert that it is nothing short of dangerous to attempt to run a boat through the Cedars, the Split Rock or the Long Sault. Freight boats are making their runs anywhere from eight to twenty-four hours late on account of the caution necessary to the safety of the passengers.

8 Inmates Dead In Asylum Fire

Eight inmates burned to death is the result of a fire which broke out in the east wing of the Main building of the Hamilton Asylum for the Insane at one o'clock Tuesday morning.

The building is on the mountain at the head of Queen street, and the fire brigade had difficulty in reaching it quickly. The flames were in the fourth storey and burned fiercely. In a short time after discovery in hall D, night-watchman Bassett turned in an alarm to the city fire brigade, while Charles Piper fought the flames with the hose till overcome.
