The union choir, though small, was efficient and the singing good.

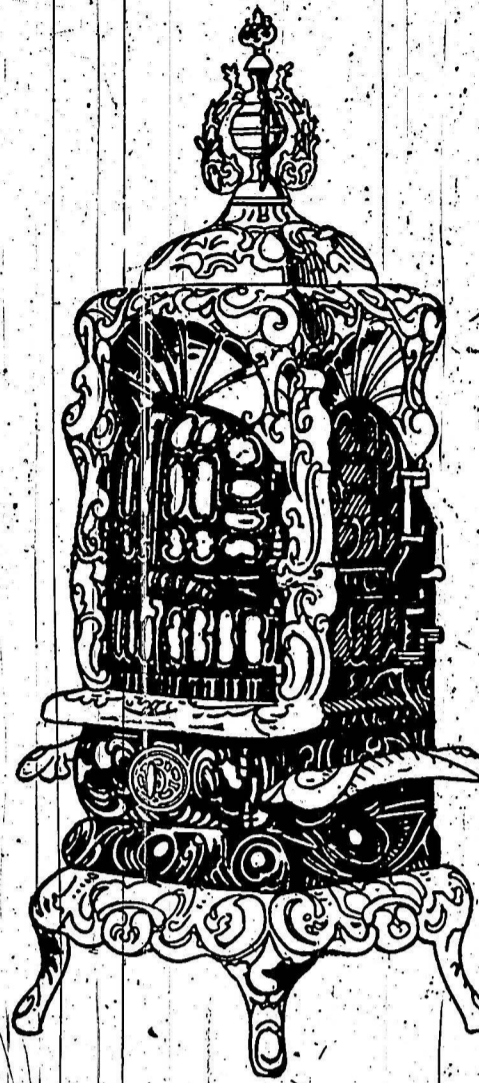

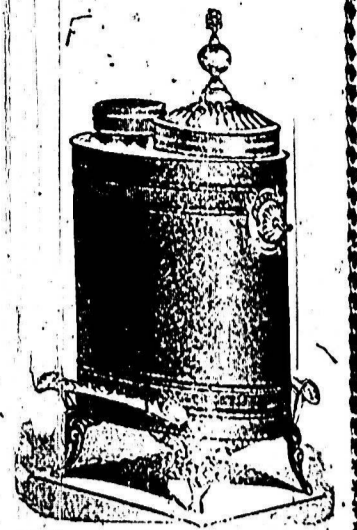

plements, the cost of which would be reduced from 2 1/2 to 5 per cent. "We don't have to trade with U.S. if we don't want to," said Mr. Clute. "The farmer is just as much a business man as anybody else. He wants the best prices possible, and if he can get them from the U.S. he will insist on having them. We need larger markets, and we have to find a market for the increased output of western wheat fields. Each year is producing more wheat in the West, and we must find an outlet. It's only a question of time when U.S. will be importing nearly everything from other countries. They want our wheat and it will stand competition with any wheat in the world. Reciprocity will re-price in the farmer getting a better price for what he has to sell."

Mr. C. W. Hartman dealt exhaustively with an account of the farmers' deputation that waited on the Dominion Government and insisted on the said Government "enacting legislation to promote their prosperity in getting larger markets." He believed this dep-
