An Irish Editor Who Does Not Know Us.

Only Admirable Thing He Saw Was The Liquor Laws.

Mr. R. H. H. Baird, of Belfast, Ireland, newspaper owner, travelled with the British journalists from Halifax to Vancouver, at the invitation of the Canadian Government, and has reached the city, says the Montreal Witness, from the west. In conversation with a newspaper man upon his arrival, he said he had no very flattering picture to paint of the country. Mr. Baird is the owner of several newspapers, one of which has many editions daily, and a weekly circulation approaching 200,000.

Mr. Baird complained of the treatment received by the travelers at the hands of the porters and baggage men, and although he has collected sufficient matter for several articles, he is at his wits end to know what is really the truth about Canada.

Mr. Baird contends that the youth of the country are receiving a course of education too elevated to be of practical use to him in the Dominion. He found the imported white labor too lazy to get proper results, and said the real estate dealings were exaggeration. It was a mania everywhere, and some one would get bitten in the long run.

In the West he found young women who had emigrated in search of husbands disillusioned, and the average Canadian, he said, was surly and uncivil, and treated the womenkind with greater harshness than he found in the Old Country. He was pleased with the liquor laws. That was Canada's one bright spot. He gave it as his opinion that if the same laws existed in Ireland and in England as in Canada there would be less emigration on the part of Britishers. The Canadian youth growing up under conditions, where drinking of liquor was more a freak than a habit, as in Europe, had a much better chance of making good than the inhabitants of the other continent.

At the conclusion of the interview Mr. Baird praised the C.P.R.

mountain hotels. The future of Canada, he said, was assured, but she needed to watch her development with care and to inspire in her sons a proper idea of what was essential to that inevitable development.

Council's Record For 1911.

In looking over my tax bill for 1911, I am much gratified to note that my taxes are so low, the increase over last year's very low tax being scarcely ten dollars on my small property. The present low rate of taxation must surely be due to the economic management, business foresight and financial ability of our present council, who have so faithfully striven to keep down the tax rate, and still carry on the business of our municipality and make the many needed improvements which this year have been made to sidewalks, roads, bridges, public parks and cemetery. The purchase by the town of a handsome new Baby Road Grader was a masterly stroke of business, as the new splendid condition of our roads will testify. The earth scraped from the roads has been considerably left in windrows in the ditches for the citizens to utilize in the future in making boulevards, etc. The elaborate street sprinkling system recently inaugurated, has been a boon to our citizens in all parts of the village, dust being now an unknown quantity. The large number of trees planted in King Edward Park has made it a REAL park, and now affords a shady resting place to our citizens.

I also wish to add a word of commendation to our council upon the completion of the sidewalk and water-works extension to the cemetery, thus making it easy of access and providing the much needed water supply to keep fresh and beautiful the grass and flowers, also the trees which our cemetery committee has set out.

Negotiations have been under way for some time for supplying large users of water, and when completed will no doubt place our one public utility upon a self-sustaining basis.

Our fire brigade has reached a high state of efficiency, its equipment being second only to the larger cities.

Among the more important municipal laws passed by our council this year was the appointment of meat and milk inspectors, who are rigidly enforcing the law, thus safeguarding the health of the community.

The location of our new town hall, public library and fire hall, has been well chosen. The building reflects great credit on all connected with its erection, and provides a safe and comfortable place in the basement for the accommodation of our numerous footsore summer visitors.

In view of this brilliant record, would it not be well to re-elect the whole-basis the present council whose slogan is Markdale a City in 1912, with a tax rate greater than has been.

Death of W. C. Roadhouse.

On Tuesday, of last week, Mr. W. A. Roadhouse, of Markdale, attended the funeral of Owen Sound of his father, Mr. W. C. Roadhouse, a well known resident of that town who passed away at his home, 1617 Fifth Avenue west, at the advanced age of seventy-six years. Mr. Roadhouse was born in Albion township, county of Peel in the year 1835. In the year 1882 he removed with his family to Elderslie township, Bruce County, where he lived on a farm until 1896, when he retired to Owen Sound. Mr. Roadhouse was a man of singular simplicity and sincerity. He was of a retiring disposition. His words were few, but his thoughts were deep and clear, and his convictions strong. Sympathetic and tender in his ministrations to those in trouble, he was often found at the bedside of the sick and dying. He will be greatly missed, not only in his own home, but by a large circle of friends and neighbors. Last spring he was taken very ill with pleurisy, which followed by a second attack a few weeks ago, from which he died on Sunday evening, Nov. 19th. Besides the widow there remain three sons and two daughters, as follows: A. D. Roadhouse, Mrs. W. A. McPaul, of Owen Sound; W. A. Roadhouse, of Markdale; Rev. S. M. Roadhouse, of Georgetown; Miss Cynthia, at home. The funeral took place from his residence to Greenwood cemetery Tuesday p.m., the service at the house being conducted by Rev. H. A. Coreless Apple Found.

Also it is Seedless—Luther Burbank to investigate. Reno, Nev., Nov. 6.—Through the accidental discovery by C. S. Seager, of Madoc County, in an orchard at Oxpine Creek, of a tree bearing seedless and coreless apples, it is hoped that, with the assistance of Luther Burbank, it will be possible to propagate seedless apples. The tree is seven years old, but has been nibbled back each year by cattle. This year it bore twenty-five perfect seedless and coreless specimens.

GIFT OF A DYING TO

Savings of a Little Child Dying of Tubercular Trouble Goes to Help the Consumptive Poor. How true it is in many different walks of life that "a little child shall lead them." We have been shown a copy of a letter written by a lady of St. John, N.B., who only a month ago lost her little child, a girl of nine years of tubercular trouble. The mother's own words tell the story better than it can be told in any other way. She writes to the Secretary of the Muskoka Free Hospital for Consumptives at Gravenhurst in these words: "While my loved one was ill, I one night opened some literature from you at her bedside. She asked me what it was, I told her it was a paper asking for prescriptions to the Muskoka Free Hospital for Consumptives, and showed her the pictures in the pamphlet. She asked if she could not give what she had in her little savings bank. I told her 'Yes'—to give it to the doctor and he would send it. But she was too sick when she came again, so I am enclosing an express order for the amount I found in the bank, viz.: \$1.75 a small subscription, but trust you will receive it in the spirit in which it was given." The letter is typical of many that are being constantly received at the head office of the Muskoka Hospital, 347 King St., W., Toronto. These come from all parts of Canada, for patients are received from anywhere in the Dominion. At the present time there are 159 patients in residence in the Muskoka Free Hospital, 128 of whom are unable to pay a single cent, and the other 29 only nominal sums—much less than actual cost of maintenance. During the nine years that the Muskoka Free Hospital for Consumptives has been opened, not a single patient has ever been refused admission because unable to pay.
