In order to accelerate the apparent motion in a motion picture the camera man makes his pictures at a slower pace. Take, for instance, a rosebud.

A camera is placed before the rosebud, focused upon the bud and photographs are taken at intervals of 31 hours. When these pictures are projected on the screen at the rate of 16 per second, the motion of the growing plant is accelerated 300 times and we see in a few seconds the moving life of the rosebud and the full blown rose that may have taken three or four days to live.

These pictures are made, says a writer in the Springfield Union, by the simple device of turning the crank of the motion picture camera at a low speed. As in the case of the rosebud, the pictures are shown at the rate of 16 a second, although they may be taken at the rate of 1 per second, so that on the screen the action is 16 times as rapid as it actually was.
