This means that every drop of water that comes into the hotel for any purpose is first filtered twice, then sterilized and cooled, rendering it not only absolutely pure from all sanitary standpoints but clear and free from any coloration. As regards ice, the water from which it is made will be filtered twice, then converted into steam, then condensed and frozen, rendering the ice not only absolutely pure but a beautiful clear transparent crystal.
