Good Roads.

The wisdom of the Ontario Government in setting aside \$5,000,000 for the improvement of the roads in all Ontario cannot be questioned. On the contrary it will receive universal plaudits as the proper thing to do, and doing it at the right time. Good roads are of as much value as any other form of public utility, and surpass many forms of widespread philanthropy. The miraculous growth of railways in Canada, and their assumption of the principal burdens of commerce blinded most of the people, till the advent of the automobile, to the imperative need for better common highways. The result has been a congestion of population at railroad centres and along railroad lines, with the consequent desertion or degeneration and non-development of more remote and inaccessible communities. Every rural county — and what county is not predominantly rural in area? — suffers from generations of indifference to this same truth. Good highways are, but irrigating canals for the better growth of good citizenship.

Notes.

A bill has been introduced into the Ontario House to amend the Marriage Act. It would provide that a clergyman, solemnizing a marriage when one of the parties is under the influence of liquor, or the clergyman has reason to believe one of the parties is an idiot or insane, shall be liable to a fine of \$500 or twelve months imprisonment.

Mr. Wm. McDonald, member for Central Bruce, in the Ontario Legislature, and editor of the Chesley Enterprise, has introduced a bill in the House to have hotel bars closed on statutory and civic holidays. Last session an amendment was made to the Liquor License Act by which hotel bars are closed on Christmas Day. Mr. McDonald's idea is to extend this to all holidays.
