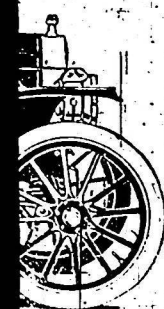

FLESHERTON

(Special to The Standard.)

Flesherton's application for incorporation as a municipality came before the Private Bills Committee of the Legislature last week, and reporting the proceedings The Globe said: "The bill was opposed on the ground that there was danger of the people in the village repealing local option if they were incorporated."

Dr. Jamieson, M.P.P. for South Grey, assured the Committee that there was no stronger local option municipality in the Province than the Township of Artemesia, and there was no danger of the people of Flesherton repealing the by-law.

In view of this the Committee decided in favor of granting incorporation to the village and still allowing home rule in the matter of local option but provided that in case the village wanted to repeal it a three-fifths vote would be required.

Flesherton is satisfied with local option, and we agree with Dr. Jamieson that the temperance sentiment is sufficiently strong to sustain the measure, but the insertion of the three-fifths clause, which was agreeable to the delegation from the village, places the matter beyond question. The village was represented by Messrs. J. A. Boyd, T. A. Blakey, W. J. Bellamy and W. H. Thurston, and the Township by Reeve McKenzie, and Councillors A. D. McLeod, George Meldrum and J. J. Graham.
