Aid to Thoroughbred Stallions.

The policy initiated in 1911 by the Department of Agriculture with reference of granting aid, under certain conditions, to the owners of Thoroughbred stallions is generally meeting with approval and is accomplishing, in part at least, the objects sought when the policy was undertaken. Amongst other things, owing to the rigid condition imposed, it is encouraging those maintaining really high class horses and is serving to organize the system of breeding followed in the different communities, where Thoroughbred stallions are located. The stimulus given in this manner, to the use of Thoroughbred blood will, it is believed, lead to an improvement in the light horse stock of the country. Thoroughbred stallions, if really good individuals, may be expected to exert such influence in the development of Canadian horses for saddle and harness use, as is greatly needed and greatly desired. The premium placed upon quality, soundness and propinquity through the grants awarded by the Department is serving to check the use of unsuitable sires and is tending to conserve a type of Thoroughbred, the utility of which is beyond question.

Believing himself to be justified, therefore, in further prosecuting the policy begun last year, the Honorable Martin Burrell, Minister of Agriculture, has authorized the continuance of the grant, to be available for all Thoroughbred stallions, standing for public service during the season of 1912, which comply with the conditions imposed by the Department. The conditions under which assistance will be given are as follows: (1) All horses on account of which aid is given by the Department must be registered in the Thoroughbred Stud Book of the Canadian National Live Stock Records.

(2) Horses shall be of good size, quality and conformation, and shall be free from all hereditary unsoundness; these conditions to be ensured by submission annually to a thorough, careful examination either at the hands of the Veterinary General or such other members of the veterinary staff of the Department, or other persons as the Minister may from time to time appoint for this purpose.

(3) Horses so approved shall be duly and properly advertised to stand for service of mares, under the ordinary and general conditions usual in the districts in which they are to be kept, at an annual service fee (except in the case of thoroughbred mares) of not more than \$10.00 to insure, such service fee to become due and payable only when mares prove to be in foal.

Any person, firm or corporation owning or controlling any Thoroughbred Stallion in regard to which all of the conditions above set forth shall have been duly and properly fulfilled, shall, on production of satisfactory evidence thereof and of the fact that a reasonable number of mares, other than Thoroughbred mares, have been served during the season, be entitled to receive at the close of each such season the sum of \$250 from the funds of the Live Stock Branch. If, in the event of a horse dying or becoming incapacitated for service during the season, an approved substitute is immediately placed in the same district, the Minister may, after due consideration of the circumstances, authorize the payment of the subsidy above mentioned.

Remuneration For Hon. Beck.

\$6,000 a Year for Minister; Gamey's New Job.

Hon. Adam Beck, chairman of the Hydro-Electric Commission, will henceforth receive an annual salary of \$6,000. This was announced in the Legislature last Thursday afternoon by Sir James Whitney.

It was generally believed that a substantial sum, probably \$25,000, would be granted Mr. Beck as a monetary recognition of his five years incurred in the public interest without a dollar of return from the province treasury. However, Mr. Beck and his colleagues, Mr. W. K. McNaught and Hon. J. S. Hendrie, had declined to accept remuneration, said the premier, for anything they had done. It was proposed, however, to provide for the chairman in the future a salary of \$6,000 per annum.

A second announcement of importance was made by the prime minister to the effect that Mr. R. R. Gamey, member for Manitowlin in the Legislature, had been chosen as the government's commissioner to take charge of the party to explore the new areas added to the province in Northern Ontario. The prime minister remarked that the special provision would have to be made in order that the member should retain his standing in the House. The new position to which Mr. Gamey has been appointed is not what is popularly known as "The \$5,000,000 job," overseeing the expenditure of that sum in the development of northern Ontario. For the latter the name of Mr. Albert Grigg, M.P.P., for Algoma, is mentioned.
