Eugenia and Priceville

The villages of Eugenia and Priceville were both laid out as town plots by the government on account of the water power at each place. The town plot at Eugenia consisted of 300 acres. People squatted on these park lots and on furnishing the Crown Land Department with proof of having built on the town lots they were allowed to purchase them at fixed reasonable prices. The town plot was no doubt surveyed about 1856, during the Crimean War, as is indicated by the names of some of the streets in the survey, such as Alma, Balaklava, Raglan, Coddington, etc. Priceville is on the main branch of the Saugeen river and a block of 1000 acres was reserved by the government when the Durham Road was laid out in 1848 and 1849. The Mill plot contained 300 acres and was sold by the government about 1857 to David Yeomans, of Mt. Forest, who built a saw mill and later a grist mill. Most of the property in the reservation has been taken possession of, but some still remains, the property of the government. One of the back streets in Priceville represents the original line of the Durham Road. East of the town plot the Gravel Road leaves the old line of the Durham Road and runs almost through the centre of Artemesia and Osprey townships, north of the original Durham Road.
