A California Letter.

T. W. Rutledge, son of the late Edward Rutledge of this place, was our first apprentice in The Standard thirty years ago. Since then he was publisher of the Times-Journal, Fort William, but is now in the real estate business in Vancouver. He and his wife and mother are now on a visit with his brother, A. E., who owns an orange grove at Monrovia in the suburbs of Pasadena, Cal. The following letter to his brother, E. S. Rutledge, in Fort William, will be read with interest by many old acquaintances:

Dear Brother, This is Monday morning, April 1st, and I thought you would no doubt be anxious to hear from us away out here in California. Since arriving here, we have been busy resting and chasing around seeing the sights of this great country. It is certainly a select part of the world to live in, though not generally what it is cracked up to be. Vancouver was somewhat disappointing to us at first, but all the same we have no desire to go back to Fort William. Likewise, California is a little disappointing at first, but I fancy after the few days we have spent here that we might get to like the place even better than Vancouver. As far as making money is concerned, one with limited means can advance faster in Fort William or almost any place in Canada, but those with capital have plenty of opportunity here to multiply. There are more poor people than I had any idea of, but they are so contented and enjoy life to the fullest that they are probably better off after all. Then, too, the country is full of wealthy people and many millionaires—but, oh, what a climate for elderly people and those in retiring years: their life is certainly prolonged. On Saturday we had an auto trip of some 150 miles through nothing but orange, lemon, and grape groves, with pretty little towns every few miles, ranging in population from 3,000 to 50,000. These places are quiet and retiring from the rush of commerce usually found in larger cities, or even cities of the same size in the east, most of them, local option towns. But, on the other hand, in the real cities here of three or four hundred thousand, like Frisco, and Los Angeles, you find something doing every minute of the day and week, where plenty of last life and vice is found on every hand. Frisco, in particular, is a wide open town both Sunday and Monday, and it is estimated that they have 40,000 unemployed at present, with some 13,000 tool chests locked up, awaiting work. Southern California has great valleys of fruit ranches almost entirely covered up to the foot hills, and then the wonderful range of mountains all around present a picture of beauty. By the way, I had a delightful two days' fishing trip through some of the ranges, taking in the famous San Gabriel canyon, where we spent the night at a summer camp some 3,000 feet above the ocean. Part of this trip we made by auto, and about 16 miles of it by a four-mule stage. The excitement of this rollicking stage drive through the canyons and the matchless grandeur of the scenery will never be forgotten. The road leads up over precipitous heights, around sharp curves down through the river bed half a hundred times into the very depths of nature. There was 10 of a party on this trip, principally Winnipeg and Brandon people.
