



Thompson's on the County Line and be constructed a mile to the north, thus deviating the water along the Arran side of the line. The Council met at the township hall on Friday, April 12th, all the members present, reeve in the chair; minutes of last meeting read and confirmed.

Rennie Hutchinson—That Samuel Doherty be authorized to procure the necessary repairs named in the list for crusher, including two sets of jaws, and have stripped to his address.—Carried.

Rennie Murray—That the following gentlemen, namely W. H. Erskine, C. G. Devitt and Jacob Lougheed, appointed Commissioners for the Euphrasia Municipal Telephone System at a legally called meeting of the subscribers for the purpose, is hereby sanctioned by this council, said system appearing in the south end of the township.—Carried.

Murray—Hutchinson—That the Clerk be instructed to prepare and send a By-Law to Collingwood Township for the erection of Telephone system through said township.—Carried.

Report of the committee re the drainage of Beaver River: Gentlemen.—We, your committee appointed to wait on the Provincial Government to secure a grant to aid in clearing out Beaver River, beg leave to report as follows:

That we had an interview with the Hon. Dr. Reaume and the Hon. L. B. Lucas, and got a promise of a grant of twenty per cent. of the total of \$1,500.00 of a straight grant, providing the ratepayers interested go on with the work and assume the balance of the cost and on the report of the engineer of the situated demand if the grant would probably be increased. All of which is respectfully submitted. N. L. CURRY, W. T. ELLIS, Committee.

Murray—Erskine—That the report of the committee be received and adopted and that Mr. Hutchinson and Mr. Ellis interview the parties interested and report at the next meeting of Council whether they are satisfied for the council to go on with the work with the promise of said grant.—Carried.

Rennie Murray—That Dr. McKeed be appointed Medical Health Officer for the Township of Euphrasia for the balance of the year 1912 and that he receive \$10.00 per month for his services.—Carried.

By Law No. 27, appointing Medical Health Officer, was passed and filed.

The following accounts were ordered to be paid: Thos. Cimack, 7½ hours man and team, at lot 13 on the valley road, \$2.25; Dr. Williams, account as Medical Health Officer, \$25.00; N. L. Curry, quarter salary, \$50.00; P. A. McAnstan, salary as collector, \$55.00; W. T. Ellis, train fare and expenses to Toronto, \$7.65.
