Interesting Lecture On Horticulture.

The hall of the Department of Agriculture was filled to the doors on Wednesday evening of last week when Prof. H. L. Hutt, of the Ontario Agricultural College, delivered an exceedingly interesting lecture to the members of the Markdale Horticultural Society. The lecture was upon Home and Town Improvement and by the use of about sixty lantern slides it was made highly instructive and illustrative.

Mr. Hutt is an expert in landscape gardening and consequently had his subject well in hand. Also, having taken a look through the town previous to the lecture he was in close touch with the requirements in both home and street planting. Consequently, the points he emphasized were made strong by local applications and several that should be of interest to all citizens were touched upon. In speaking of the old-fashioned front fences he said that the dilapidated form was much too prevalent in the town; that the modern front lawn was not fenced in at all, but instead was graded and seeded right to the street. Planting in straight lines or the formal method he said had also been practised too much. As a better and more pleasing method he suggested the use of natural curves and a more informal style; the planting of shrubs and trees in such a manner that they seemed a piece of Nature's work only. The use of climbers to cover ugly walls and the use of shrubs to hide an unsightly background was also forcibly shown. Backyards, instead of being made a spot for the ash pile and a receptacle for tin cans, and waste paper, should be turned into a garden, into a spot where many a pleasant evening might be spent; a place that would be a source of enjoyment to the whole family and that they would all take an interest in.

He further went on to say that considerable street planting could be worked to much advantage. As far as he could judge, Markdale was very backward in this respect and with several exceedingly good slides he pointed out the best manner in which such improvement might be accomplished. He advocated that the council take hold of this matter and named several of our hardest and best shade trees that could be used for the purpose. This is a bare outline of the lecture and we feel sure that all who heard Mr. Hutt will look forward to hearing him again some time in the near future.

Several good musical numbers, rendered throughout the evening, helped to add variety to the programme. Miss Hissett favored the audience with a recitation, while Misses Casser, and Clark rendered an excellent piano duet. Mr. G. A. Clark very ably occupied the chair.

With the singing of God Save the King the evening's programme was brought to an end.

The Orange Hawkweed

Systematic Efforts will be Made to Overcome This Pest in Eastern Townships. A campaign is to be waged against the Orange Hawkweed by the Dominion Government this summer. This weed, which is easily distinguished by its flaming red flowers during the month of June, was introduced into the Eastern Townships of Quebec several years ago from the State of Vermont. It has spread with such rapidity as to give cause for alarm. In an interview this week, Dr. Gussow, Dominion botanist, stated to a representative of the Family Herald and Weekly Star, that the Orange Hawkweed is likely to give trouble, and unless something is done now there is a danger of its being spread all over Canada. The first step to be taken by the Government in the work of eradication is the preparation of a special bulletin on the weed, which will be sent to the farmers of the Eastern Townships. The bulletin will give a full description of the weed and the best known methods of fighting it. The bulletin will be accompanied by a handsome color reproduction of the weed. It will be mounted on heavy cardboard and the work will be of such a high order that the picture will be too pretty to throw away. The idea is that the farmer who receives it will hang it up in a prominent place in his kitchen, or in some room where it will be always conspicuous. There is an object in this, for even if the farmer has only a few of these weeds on his farm he will immediately recognize it and destroy it before it has made any headway.

Military Camp Opens May 30.

For five weeks commencing on May 30th, Niagara-on-the-lake, will be turned into a huge military camp of instruction. The city regiments will be the first arrivals and will be followed by rural battalions on June 3rd and June 17, respectively.
