

Three highly respected old residents of Artemesia have within a few days passed away in the persons of Mr. Anthony Kenny, Mrs. John Bates, sr., and Mrs. Robert J. Carson. Anthony Kenny, who was born in the County Mayo, Ireland, and had reached the age of 92 years, died on the 3rd inst. at Barrie, at the home of his daughter, from where the funeral took place at the R. C. cemetery. Mr. Kenny came to Canada when a young man and at Pickering was married to Miss Margaret Leean, who died at her late home on the 1st line seven years ago. In 1853 Mr. Kenny settled in Artemesia, where he constantly lived until going to Barrie two years ago. He is survived by five sons and three daughters, Richard, Parry Sound; Thomas, Toronto; Michael, Orillia; Peter, Blind River; Wm. Dunn, Barrie; Mrs. P. McLaughlin, Barrie; Mrs. N. Jacobs, Parry Sound; and Mrs. J. Hall, Barrie.

Mr. John Bates, who was a daughter of the late William White of the old Burham Road, Artemesia, died on the 13th inst. at the home of her daughter in Toronto, from where the funeral took place at Humbleton Cemetery. The deceased, who was in her 85th year, was born in the County Tyrone, Ireland, from where when quite young she came with her parents to Canada and nearly sixty years ago settled in Artemesia with her husband, the late Mr. John Bates, who died at Fergusham 30 years ago. Six sons and four daughters survive: John W., Toronto; Wm. Stockport, N.Y.; Thomas, Allentown, Wash.; Brigadier-General Robert Saul Ste. Marie, Mich.; David and George, Niagara Falls, N.Y.; Mrs. Thomas Cooper, Fergusham; Mrs. Thos. Bell, Oberon, N.Y.; Mrs. Edward Bryson, Toronto, and Mrs. H. J. Hampton, Vancouver, B.C.

Mr. Robert J. Carson, who a year ago suffered a paralytic stroke, from which he had partially recovered, was again seized on Saturday afternoon last and passed away suddenly at his home near Saugoch Junction. Mr. Carson, who was born in the north of Ireland, passed his 73rd birthday on March 2nd and was a remarkably well-preserved man. At 17 years of age he came to Canada and after living a few years near Toronto, he came to Artemesia, with the pioneers and took up the farm on which he spent his last days. He was an industrious farmer, a good neighbor, and held in high esteem in the community. In 1866 Mr. Carson was married to Miss Margaret Henderson, eldest daughter of the late Mr. Robert Henderson, of Artemesia, who survives him. After their marriage five years were spent on the now Thos. Sled farm near this village, when they then moved to their own farm. Twelve children were born to them, eleven of whom survive their father, namely: John and Robert, at home; Armin, in Toronto; Mrs. J. Stinson, Mrs. Andrew Brown, and Mrs. Kerns, in Saskatchewan; Mrs. R. Wilson, Mrs. G. Dean, at the Soo, Ont.; Mrs. W. Dingwall, in Portion; Mrs. G. Miles, Portion Station, and Miss Edith, Toronto. A large circle of friends sympathized with the bereaved family, who will greatly miss an affectionate and kind husband and father. The funeral took place to Flesherton cemetery on Tuesday afternoon under the auspices of L.O.L. No. 244, of which deceased was one of the oldest members. In religion he was an Anglican and the service at the house was conducted by his pastor, Rev. Mr. Williams, of Dunlop. Mr. Carson was a staunch Conservative, and when duty called was loyal to his country. He was among the first members of No. 6 Company of Volunteers when organized here in 1866 and a few years ago, with others, received the Government scrip for land grant in recognition of his services.
