A HANGMAN'S ROPE.

Official Spies to Recover It After An Execution.

TESTED RECIPES.

Salmon Chowder—One can salmon, three potatoes, three table-spoons butter or drippings, two slices onion, one-half teaspoon salt, one-eighth teaspoon pepper, three cups milk, three table-spoons flour, two crackers split. Open salmon, remove bones, scald and flake fine. Parboil potatoes and slice thin. Fry onion in fat, add flour, cook three minutes. Add two cups boiling water and potatoes, cook until tender—about fifteen minutes; add seasoning, salmon and milk. Roll up once and serve garnished with minced parsley, and split crackers dipped in hot milk.

Carrots with Butter Sauce—Three cups chopped or sliced carrots, two table-spoons butter, two and a half cups boiling water, one teaspoon salt, two table-spoons flour, few grains pepper. Fry carrots in butter till a little soft. Add flour, seasonings and water, let boil, then simmer till the carrots are tender about an hour.

Cream of Potato Soup—Three large potatoes, two table-spoons flour, four cups milk, two table-spoons drippings, salt, onion, small onion, two table-spoons salt, little pepper. Boil potatoes and soft, then drain and wash them. Cook the onion in the milk. When the potatoes are mashed, add the scalded milk, salt and pepper. Run it through a strainer. Melt drippings in small saucepan, add the flour and a little of the soup. Add this to the soup and let boil up once.

Cracked Wheat—Two cups cracked wheat, one and one-half table-spoons salt, boiling water. Rinse wheat in cold water, then put a few in cold water to cover for a week. Add salt and boiling water to cover again, and simmer on back of range, in oven on the fireless cooker till soft—about five hours—replenishing water as needed.

Peach Compote—One-half cup, one can peaches, boiling water, Blanch rice, then boil in slightly salted boiling water till tender, drain, form into balls. Make a sauce of one cup of peach juice, two table-spoons sugar, two table-spoons butter, one table-spoon lemon juice, one table-spoon starch. Cook peach juice, sugar and cornstarch together till thick, remove from fire, add lemon juice and butter and pour over peaches and rice.

Stewed Lentils—One and one-half cups lentils, one teaspoon sugar, two table-spoons butter, one and one-half table-spoons salt, one quarter teaspoon pepper. Soak lentils overnight, drain, rinse and cover with boiling water and cook slowly for one and one-half hours. Drain again, return to hotbed and seasonings, let become very hot and serve.

Brown Sugar Sauce—One cup brown sugar, one-quarter teaspoon vanilla, one cup boiling water, one-half table-spoon cornstarch. Mix sugar and water together. Wet cornstarch with a little cold water and stir into the first mixture. Let boil five minutes, stirring all the time, then add vanilla.

Strawberries in Custard—Make a rich boiled custard with six beaten eggs, omitting the whites of two, one small cupful of granulated sugar, a pinch of salt, one cup of rich milk, and half a cupful of blanched almonds. When done remove it once from the fire and flavor with teaspoonful of lemon extract. Put in a deep glass dish, sprinkle liberally with sugar, and pour over a layer of the custard; add more strawberries and sugar and pour over the remainder of the custard. Garnish with large strawberries as the center and blanche almonds, placed around them for petals. Serve with any light, delicate cake.

USEFUL HINTS.

Whip cream in a pitcher instead of a bowl to do it in half the time and without spattering.
 To make silk that has been washed look like new put a teaspoonful of methylated spirits to a pint in rinsing water and iron while damp.
 Wringing out a cloth in hot water and wiping furniture will help putting on furniture cream will result in a high polish and will not show finger marks.
 Brass takes a most beautiful polish if it is washed in a mixture of one ounce of alum and a pint of lye applied together for a short time. Apply with rag or brush while hot.
 To remove varnish stains wash with alcohol and rub with a soft cloth. Repeat until all stain is removed, then wash in a hot solution of soda. Teaspoonful of soda to half a pint of water, if the fabric will bear it.

When selecting poultry see that the feet are soft and moist; the legs green and the flesh plump.
 Salt water will clean laundry, but nitrate and caffeine and indiarubbing and will prevent from turning yellow.
 If a panful of lime is kept in the pantry, where the preserves and jellies are stored it will keep them from molding.
 To set poached eggs and keep them in good shape add a little vinegar besides salt in the water when cooking them.
 To prevent table linen from becoming yellow fold it in an old sheet that has been well blued before putting it away.
 To prevent low shoes rubbing the heel paste a piece of velvet large
