

Second Week At Niagara Camp

Editor Standard:

In response to your request for a further account of Niagara camp and of F. Co. 31st in particular, I would submit the following, which is a transcript from our diary of

Monday was spent in the camp commons and in the beautiful oak park adjoining, the time being de oted to outpost duty, protecting an army supposed to be in camp. outpost company, picquet and was carried on exactly as if we were in an enemy's country and the different companies in the regi-ment were given in turn the dif-

ferent positions and duties. Tuesday was picnic day for the 14th brigade on the great tract of park land which the government has recently purchased out beyond the Chatautiua ranges! panied by the 35th and 36th and their respective bands we started out on our four mile tramp at 8.30 a.m. Every man had his lunch in his haversack and each company had a water carrier. Except for an intermission of two hours at noon for lunch and rest we were kept on the go carrying on manoeuvres as the advance guard of an army on the march Besides acquiring some idea of this work as performed in actual warfare, the men weke given instruction and practice, in acting on commands given by signal rather than by word of mouth.
