Cullough's assessment reduced to \$600; Adam Holly entered as tenant for the Diner farm, M.J. and Jos. Firth entered as tenants for 3 of 28, con. 1, E.G.R.; Wm. Calder and Alex. McCabe entered for cement right of way. The court adjourned to call of the chairman.

Paul Nelson was appointed pathmaster instead of Thos. Nelson. \$100 was granted to improve Murray's Hill.

A committee of council consisting of the Reeve, Lindsay and McMillan was appointed to rebuild the McGilvary Bridge. The Council adjourned to July 6th at 10 a.m.
