## Condition of the Roads

Those Within the Town Limits Are Subject of Much Criticism.

Speaking of highways you ought to see some of the roads around Markdale! No, they are not another example of the kind provision of nature by which you are treated to an exhilarating "Bump the Bumps" or "Chute the Chutes" without the usual nickel touch!

The motion system to these roads is rather too nerve-racking to be termed exhilarating, and rather too violent to be termed enjoyable. Those who have been doing considerable traveling recently throughout the county claim that one of the worst strips is the House of Refuge hill within the town limits of Markdale!

A ride over this road in an automobile is almost sufficient to drive away any doubt in the mind of passenger or onlooker as to the genuineness of this statement.

The usual constituents that go to make up the anatomy of a road are almost entirely lacking; and a bed of boulders and numerous potholes caused by the heavy rains in the spring are the remains of this section of highway.
