WEIGHT OF A TRAIN.

The Dining Car Alone, Ready For Service, Weighs 140,000 Pounds. The heaviest of all the cars in a "limted" train is the dining car, which is ordinarily of a weight in excess of the other cars by 10,000 or 15,000 pounds Between the car construction and the necessary kitchen equipment and icebox contents, a full size standard dining car tips the scales at 140,000 pounds when ready to make its customary di-

Therefore, on the principle that in case of collision a passenger is eafer to the strong, heavy coach in the center of a vestibuled train, the dining car is a good place to remain.

A sixteen section sleeping car may welch from 110,000 to 125,000 pounds. weight at 107 000 pounds. The baggage car, weighing 85,000 pounds, may be the lightest in a train, but the postal war next to it weighs on an average 103.600, bounds, a reclining chair car is full weight at 87,000 pounds, while the ordinary passenger coach weighs 93.)00 pounds.

Two Pairs Are Sometimes Broken to

Oblige Finicky Customers. When a one legged man buys a shoathe dealer sends to the factory for a shoe to match the one left remaining. In these days of the use of machinery in every process of their manufacture shoes are made with the utmost exactness and precision, and it is easily possible to mate that remaining shoe with the greatest nicety in size, style, material and finish.

Few people have feet exactly alike Commonly the left foot is larger than the night, so that, one shoe may fit a little more snugly than the other. Commonly, however, people buy shoes in regularly matched pairs, the difference in their feet, if it is noticeable to them at all, not being enough to make any other course desirable.

But there are people who buy shoes of different sizes or widths, in which case the dealer breaks two pairs for hem, giving them, to fit their feet, one slice from each. In such cases the dealer matches up the two remaining shoes, one from each of two jairs, just as he would where he had broken one pair to sell one shoe to a one legged

Halcyon Days. The seven days preceding and the seven days following the winter sol stice were called by the ancients "halcyon days." This phrase is derived from a fable which sets forth that Halcyone, a princess who grieved so deeply for the loss at sea of her spouse, was sent thither in pity in the form of a haleyon bird or kingbisher. According to the legend, the haleyon bird had during the time of breeding the power of lulling the waves, and it was believed at this time the sea was always calm and might be navigated in perfect security. Experience, of course, dispelled this fable; but, like many another old world story, it has left behind distorted meaning. In this case the connection between the old and the new significance is clear, for the term, once expressive of peace and calm upon the waters, is equally expressive of tranquillity upon the sea of life.
