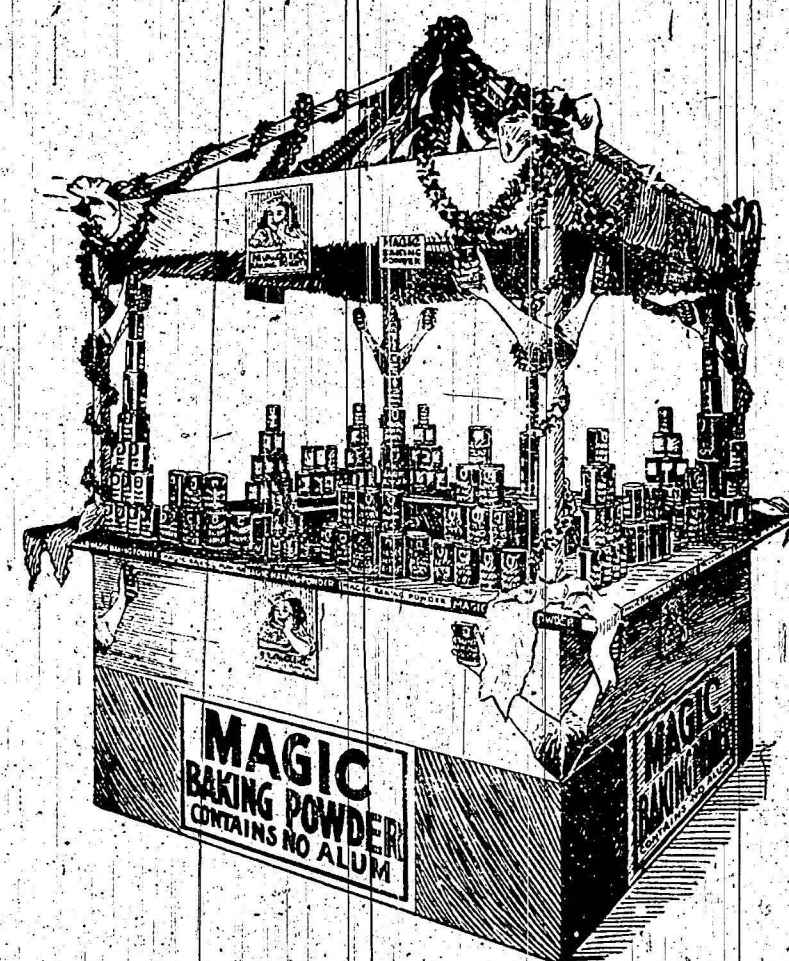

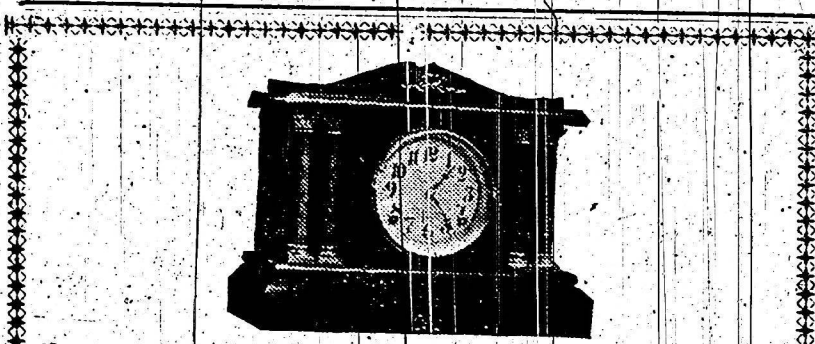

A. Johnston came in 1st, 2nd and 3rd in the order named.

The total proceeds of the day amounted to over \$550.00.

Chief McCutcheon claims it was the most orderly crowd for its size that he has ever handled.

All the horse racing events advertised were pulled off, with the exception of the gentleman's road race, for which there were no entries.

The local representative of the Department of Agriculture, Mr. H. C. Duff, and his assistant, Mr. Palmer, had a tent in which were exhibited the latest varieties of grains, grasses, weeds, insects, etc., which proved very interesting.

Hill Bros. had a tent on the grounds in which was displayed their "Canada Range." The tent was in charge of Mr. Carman King, and hot cakes, manufactured on the spot by Allison, the baker, were handed out to the crowd, who had no hesitation in declaring that the "Canada Range" was all right.

There were four Government judges present, and seven appointed by the Society: Light horses, J. Hamilton, Guelph; Heavy horses, J. Arbogast, Selkirkville; Cattle, Sheep and Swine—W. A. Sarjeant, Markdale; Grain, Seeds, Roots, Fruit and Vegetables, Mr. H. C. Duff and C. R. Palmer, Markdale; Poultry, Mr. J. Wright, Owen Sound.

Almost a \$200.00 house greeted the ladies in the afternoon in the Marsh Hall in the evening. The hall was packed to the doors and an excellent concert was provided. Hon. I. B. Lucas opened the proceedings with a short address, in which he eulogized the work of the officers of the Agricultural Society. The Owen Sound Highland Band gave a couple of well rendered selections. The entertainers were Mr. E. L. Pigott, humorist; Miss Mildred Walker, Eltonist; and Miss Eva Cuthbert, Character Artist. All proved themselves in the A 1 class of entertainers, and their various numbers were well received. Mr. J. H. Dundas capably presided at the piano.

The Highland Band of Owen Sound, was one of the best features of the day. Ten pipers, a bass drum and two snare drums composed the organization, and their music was an inspiration. There is something in the skill of the bagpipers that stirs the blood and warms the heart to tender emotions; especially is it dear to the hearts of old Scotland's sons and daughters, and by the glowing expression on their faces and their delighted comments on the music, those of this nationality could be easily distinguished in the crowd. The Highland Band scored a triumph at the Markdale Fair, and not only did they supply good music and plenty of it, but the members of the Band conducted themselves in a very gentlemanly manner, indeed.

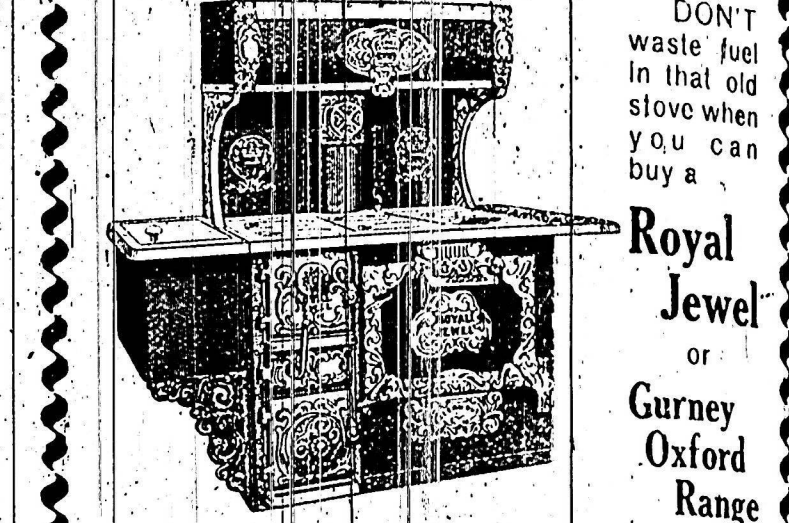
