Alliance Convention.

Mr. Hamer in Town.

The annual convention of the Centre Grey Alliance for the suppression of the liquor traffic was held in Markdale on Wednesday of last week. Considering the bad state of the weather, the attendance was remarkably good. Delegates, who had driven many miles through the rain and the muddy roads, were present from all points of the riding, and a good deal of business was transacted.

The afternoon session was held in the Presbyterian Church, where the Rev. A. E. Owen, of Chatsworth, conducted the devotional exercises. Reports from all the municipalities were presented on the progress of the cause, and the convention was furnished with information regarding the working of the Local Option by-law.

The election was held in the afternoon, the resolution of confidence in High Constable Cook was passed, and several members of the County Council were present, they were requested to see that the said resolution was presented to that body.

The elections then took place, which resulted as follows: Pres. Wm. Briscoe, Esq., Chatsworth; Vice Pres. Rev. R.M. Phalen, of Markdale; 2nd Vice Pres., Jarvis Henry; 3rd Vice Pres., Mr. McLean; 4th Vice Pres., Mrs. Thomas Cook; Secretary, T. R. McKenzie, Port Law.

Treasurer, J. Artley, Markdale. Convenors for Municipalities: Thorburn, R. Conn; Osprey, A.N. Brownridge; Artemesia, R. Cook; Markdale, W.G. Pickell; Holland, G. J. Ritchie; Chatsworth, W.G. Merriam; Collingwood, S.R. Knight; Sullivan, S. Hemstock; Euphrasia, J.M. Davis; Flesherton, W.A. Armstrong.

The evening session was held in the Methodist Church, the Rev. E.W. Wellwood, of Flesherton, taking charge of the devotions. The Markdale orchestra rendered several selections during the evening and Mrs. C.E. Armstrong sang an effective solo in her usual excellent manner. The speeches of the evening were delivered by the President, and by Mr. Frank W. Duggan, of Toronto, one of the Field Secretaries of the Dominion Alliance. Both gentlemen dealt with the matter of Local Option, and Mr. Duggan showed that in the large majority of cases where it had been carried, there had been much improvement in business conditions and in all that affects the public welfare that no one even whispered of repeal. In the few instances where repeal had been attempted, Local Option had been sustained by an increased majority for the most part, and the work was gathering strength as time passed on.

A vote of thanks proposed by Mr. Rorie and seconded by Rev. H.E. Wellwood, terminated the proceedings, and subsequently a meeting of the local officers of the Alliance was held.

There is no rush of applicants to succeed John Fry, of Niagara Falls, Ont., who after 35 years has resigned as United States customs watchman at the bridge. He was paid \$1.00 a year.

Drill Hall Progress.

The damage done by the rain and wind storm a week ago to the west end of the newly erected drill hall has been rebuilt, and the opposite end was completed at noon this Wednesday. Mr. Geo. Protog, contractor for the brick work, with his capable staff have made remarkably good progress, and did an excellent job, while supervisor Thos. Cook looked after supplies in his accustomed systematic and capable fashion. If the present favorable weather continues for a week, the roof will be on. The building is 62x106 feet with 16 ft. walls, and contains one hundred and twenty-five thousand brick.

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
