With four little children, they came out to Canada in 1852, living a few years in Toronto and Durham, but in 1856 moved to lot 19 on the 3rd con. of Glenelg and resided there, their remaining years, where they lived out a most comfortable home and reared a family of twelve children as follows: Irving, of Glenelg Centre; Margaret, Mrs. Arch. Butters, died 25 years ago; John, of Duluth; George, died 8 years ago; Isabella, Mrs. G. R. Simpson, of Vancouver; Mary W. Mrs. Jas. Mantell, of Tillsonburg; James, of Calgary; Martha, Mrs. Geo. Grant, of Toronto; Jovina, Mrs. D.J. Simpson, of Vancouver; Alexander, of Durham; Sask. Agents died in infancy; Thos. H., on the old homestead; Mrs. Anderson was a woman of wonderful strength, a neighbor ever obliging and kind, and the home was always noted for its hospitality and friendliness. She was a loving mother and the family bond was a very strong one, as was attested by the care for her exhibited by Mrs. Grant, Mrs. Mantell and Mrs. G.R. Simpson, who left their homes and took turns in waiting on her. The funeral took place on the following Thursday, to Zion cemetery, officiating in the home and by the open grave and a large concourse showed their sympathy and respect by following the casket to its final resting place.
