Death of John E. Boales New Manager of House of Refuge

In the prime of life and vigor of health Mr. John E. Boales, who has for some four years been produce buyer for McFarland & Co., here, passed away on Sunday a.m. last. Mr. and Mrs. Boales, recently returned home a month ago, from a five months' outing in the West, and he resumed his former position on the market, but an old trouble with varicose veins necessitated a few days off duty, which he took, and on Saturday he looked forward to resuming on Monday, but an attack of heart trouble developed about 10 o'clock Sunday and in little more than an hour the vital spark had fled. Deceased was a robust active man of genial disposition, universally respected, and his sudden death came as a rude shock to the whole community, and crushing blow to Mr. Weir, of Glenelg, and Mr. Binns. Short Course in Stock Judging

Held at Chatsworth. — Splendid Banquet on Friday Night.

Under the auspices of the Department of Agriculture, the Holland Agricultural Society held two days' Short Course in Stock Judging at Chatsworth on Nov. 28th and 29th.

Two classes each of Leicester and Shropshire Sheep were under discussion in the forenoon of the first day, and the afternoon was taken up with the judging of three classes of Cattle. The class of beef steers afforded much interesting discussion. Mr. Johnson, of Myrtle, the Government Judge, conducted his work well, giving a good deal of information on both sheep and cattle.

Friday was the horse day. A class of Roadsters, a class of Hackneys, and two classes of Heavy Horses were used for demonstration and judging. Dr. Reed, of Georgetown, the well-known horse judge, presided. The interest shown was remarkable, as many as 350 men being in attendance on Friday afternoon at the rink where the Course was held.

The entire affair arose out of the local option fight in Artemesia about six years ago in which Constable Cook took an active part on the temperance side. The first time that a petition asking that the local option by law be submitted in the township of Artemesia was presented to the County Council, the council refused to submit the by-law, the vote of the township being in favor. The next year the by-law was defeated and the local option by law was carried by a large majority. Since then, as in other places where the local option by law is in force, every effort has been made by the breeders to get the by-law passed.
