### Dr. Daniels on Local Option

On Thursday evening of last week, Dr. Daniels, of Owen Sound, delivered a very interesting address on "The Question of the Hour."

He showed that all parties were agreed upon two things. First, that intemperance is a great vice, and should be strictly curtailed. The point at which parties differed was in reference to the plans to be adopted for its curtailment. Some held to license as being sufficient. Others insisted upon prohibition, or local option.

Placing the one over against the other, Dr. Daniels showed, by facts and arguments that were unsatisfactory, that local option was by far the best and most effective measure for dealing with the drink problem.

At the close, Dr. Daniels explained the present position of the question in Owen Sound. A year ago the Council, without consulting the citizens, brought on a referential measure. The citizens by a large majority, however, sustained local option. The day of voting was bitterly cold, and persons were allowed to warm themselves where voting was going on. On this account the temperance members of the Council were unseated. On this account, too, the by-law has been thrown out. The fun of it is that the liquor men, voted for under the self-same conditions, retain their seats. Also, the other by-laws that were voted on at the same time are valid! "The law is a hazz," said Mr. Bumble.
