The Xmas Service at St. Matthew's Church, Berkeley, which was held last Sunday, was largely attended. The congregation joined heartily in the beautiful Xmas hymns. The Rector preached from the words "His name shall be called Immanuel, which is being interpreted, God with us."

There will be a mass meeting in the Methodist Church on Sunday night at 8:15 after the regular evening services. Addresses will be delivered by resident speakers and by others from a distance, including Rev. A. C. Myles, rector of Anglican Church, Cremona, and Master Willie Morris, the famous Toronto Bob Soprano, and Miss Irving, of Owen Sound, will render selections.

Christ Church.

The services in Christ Church on Christmas Day were well attended, and the number of communicants exceptionally large. The choir was present in full force. While entering the church the choir sang, "Christmas Awake! Salute the Happy Morn," and the other Christmas hymns were "O Come All Ye Faithful," and "Hark the Herald Angels Sing," the latter being sung as a Recessional.

A pleasing feature was the heartiness with which the congregation joined in the hymns, and, indeed, in the service throughout. During the offertory the choir sang the Xmas Anthem, "How Beautiful Upon the Mountains." The Rector was assisted at the Eucharist by Rev. Mr. Williams, Rector of Dundalk, who was spending Christmas Day with relatives in town. The sermon was taken from St. Luke 22: "Unto you is born this day in the City of David a Saviour, which is Christ the Lord." The offering to the Rector was a very generous one.

Last Sunday the hymns were again sung, and at Morning Prayer the choir sang the anthem, "How Beautiful Upon the Mountains," and at Evensong "Behold I Bring Good Tidings," by Simpler. The musical rendering at the services both on Xmas Day and on Sunday last, reflected great credit on the choir under the capable leadership of Miss Macpherson.

The Sunday School Ten and Entertainment of Christ Church will be held in the basement this Thursday evening, Jan. 2nd. All the parents of the scholars are invited to the ten which will be served at 6 o'clock. The children or others are kindly requested to send in their baskets at 5:30. Love Committed On Murder Charge

Will Stand Trial At the Spring Assizes in Owen Sound.

Henry Love, of Ceylon, was again taken to Owen Sound jail on Monday evening to await his trial at the Spring Assizes on the charge of having murdered his wife, Hannah Lucille Love, at her home in Ceylon, probably on the night of Monday, Dec. 9, last, or early the following Tuesday morning. Love was committed for trial at six o'clock Monday evening of this week by Magistrate McGill, after an investigation which lasted five hours, and during which the evidence of thirteen witnesses was taken.

Local Option Meeting

There was a large attendance in the Methodist Church on Saturday evening. The meeting was opened by prayer by Rev. R. M. Phalen, Rev. W. H. Adams, who presided, said that some persons objected to a meeting like that being held in a church. He contended, on the contrary, that there was no place more appropriate, indeed no place so appropriate, as that. That was

the speaker warned the audience of the literature which with its jugged figures, its distorted statistics, would be poured into this place at the last moment of the campaign, when it was, as the liquor party hoped, too late for the temperance people to answer it. Mr. Ruthven MacDonald, the famous advocate of lar abolition, followed with one of his choice selections in which he declared we would bury the drink demon, "bury him deeply down."

Rev. Professor Cotton, of Wesley College, was the last speaker. He showed that men made themselves great by attaching themselves to a great cause, and that the cause they represented was indeed a great one. He characterized the drink evil as a social sin. It was that for which society at large was responsible. It was not the liquor alone, but society which was responsible for the scourge and sorrow, for the degradation and death which drink always entailed. Pressing home the argument for the responsibility of Christian men, he brought his speech to a close by urging those present not to trust to others from a distance to rid Markdale of the evil, but to address themselves earnestly to the task. The meeting closed with the benediction.
