## Funeral of the Late William Armstrong

The funeral of the late Mr. William Armstrong took place on Wednesday of last week. Rev. Josiah Greene, of Clinton, who was one of the pioneer ministers of this district over forty years ago, and a close personal friend of the deceased gentleman, together with Rev. W. H. Adams, took charge of the services at the house and in the Methodist church, where a large number of sympathizing friends had gathered. Mr. Greene, despite his more than four score years, preached a fitting sermon from "These all died in faith," and dwelt on the lessons suggested by the life and death of the departed. Rev. Mr. Adams followed with a tribute of respect to his departed friend. He spoke of the bereaved wife, which Mr. Armstrong made him on their first meeting, and of the refinement of both thought and feeling which he had always noted as being his distinguishing characteristic.

At the close of the service the cortege moved to the cemetery, where the last rites were performed. The pall bearers were his five sons with a grandson, Herbert E. Gregory.

During his declining years since the decease of his life partner, his family affection, which was always prominent, was still more apparent, and his increasing wants were tenderly and generously met by his devoted daughters at home, Misses Sophia and Nellie.
