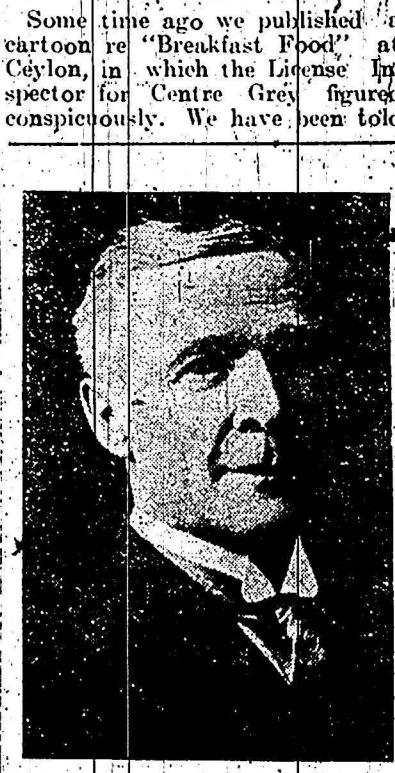
Mr. George Reid, of Regina, is visiting relatives in Egremont and was in town over Sunday, the guest of his sister, Mrs. Will Johnston.

Rates Up for Printing.

The universal advance on the cost of living has brought about a very material increase in the price of almost every commodity. An organized effort has been going on for some two years by the printers and cost of materials throughout Canada to secure a fair and equitable tariff for the various times produced in printing offices, and a new price list of the same nature came into effect last October over the Dominion. Some of our municipal officers are now saying hard things about the new tariff, but they first ought to know their own business before using their tongues. Take for example: Voters lists and pamphlets of similar character. Twenty-five years ago \$7.00 a page was considered a reasonable price for such. Wages were then but one half what they are today while other expenses have advanced proportionately. Not the oil price remained, and in some cases that low figure was not a third of half. The municipalities have consequently been "doing" the printers for years and now when an effort is made to adjust prices, there should be no kick coming from those who have profited so long and materially at the expense of country publishers.

Obituary.

(From the Copperville Observer.)
George V. Holman was born November 15th, 1872, in Grey County, Ontario, where he was a young man when he came to Markdale where he has since lived.

A printer by trade, he worked in several printing offices in Michigan, viz: the Copperville Office, the Ravenna Time Print Co., and the Grand Rapids Printing Department of the C. O. & G. Rapids.

He was married August 27th, 1901, to Elizabeth VanAlst, of Copperville, and to this union two children were born, namely: now ten years old, and Elizabeth, aged eight, both of whom the widow is left to rear and care for. He also leaves in his home three sisters and a brother, Rev. David A. Holman, of Grand Rapids, and a sister, Mrs. John Clark, of Markdale.

About two years ago Mr. Holman contracted the dread disease tuberculosis, and though he spent a year in the Grand Rapids tuberculosis sanatorium, in the hope of regaining his health, he found himself gradually losing his strength, and wished to go home which he did a few weeks before he died. The end came on Wednesday, February 13th, 1913.

He was ready to go to such a home in God that he could stake an eternity upon his health. His brother asked him to go, but he died.

Predicts Premiership For Hon. I. B. Lucas

The appointment of the Hon. I. B. Lucas to the position of Treasurer of the Province of Ontario, to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Hon. Mr. Matheson, will be received with general satisfaction throughout the Province. The new Provincial Treasurer is a man of pronounced ability and very high personal character. In point of ability, many men on both sides of the House place Hon. Mr. Lucas second only to the Provincial Secretary, Hon. Mr. Hanna, but the Arrow inclines to give the former the first place. There is not a man in the House who possesses the wonderful self-control and unflinching quality of the new Provincial Treasurer. Nothing seems to disturb the quiet tenor of his life or upset his equanimity. He seldom addresses the House on any public question, but when he does he commands attention of all, regardless of political complexion. As a speaker, he is always logical and convincing as well as fluent. His manner is gracious and cordial, but the man who imagines him to be an "easy mark" for a flimsy game will be very speedily undeceived. He reads men quickly and accurately, and in this respect he more closely resembles the late Mr. Hon. Sir John A. McDonald than any other man in the House of today. Fifteen years ago the writer was asked his opinion of Hon. I. B. Lucas as a public man. "He will be Prime Minister some day," was the reply. And the writer has never changed his opinion from that day to this.

Presentation to Miss Neely
