In summing up the arguments on the contrary sides we are forced to the conclusion that success in business depends largely on the sale of intoxicating liquor and my own observation is directly opposite. To illustrate, I will give an incident, one of hundreds, occurring continually:

A gentleman finding the alcohol habit becoming too strong for him tries to break off by total abstinence when an old friend persuades him to take a glass. It pierces his blood and his whole system goes out for it and for days his business is neglected until he is on the border of delirium tremens; then, it takes some time to straighten up again. He spends one hundred dollars or more in cold cash and as much more in neglecting his work. His family, through loss of rest and constant anxiety, are in a frenzy of despondency almost on the verge of insanity. A nurse recently told me of a very wealthy gentleman coming to a large city hospital where he was nursing and before he left was heard to say, "This last bout of 'larrying long at the wine' has cost me three thousand dollars."

Yes, looking from every standpoint, whiskey does a rushing business. For wherever the currency is, there will be a dealer he gathers together. As far as I can see, there are only two legitimate lines of trade benefited by it, the "undertaker" and the "grave digger."

The contest is over and the "re-ording angel" has noted the facts which will have to be met before the "bar of God" at some future time.

If the Christian voters in your own and vicinity had been united nothing could have prevented the passing of Local Option in your midst. Remember, you have dear little boys and also, five large ones growing to be men. Take care that "your house is not left unto you desolate."
