"The Hub of Grey County" the Most Strategic Point for the Location of New County Buildings.

An agitation has been going on in Owen Sound for some time with regards to new public buildings in that town, and we understand an effort will be made to have the town and county unite and erect a large building in Owen Sound in which all the municipal offices of the town and county could be located.

Another year Owen Sound will have withdrawn from the jurisdiction of the county council and become a separate body, thus severing a link between the county and the present County Capital.

Markdale has part of the County buildings here now—the House of Refuge—while the Ontario Department of Agriculture considered this town the best place in the county for the location of its branch. We are almost in the exact centre of the county, have fair railroad connections, and splendid accommodation for any large body of men such as would meet at the County Council sessions.

Markdale is without doubt the most strategic point for the location of the same. The question of incorporation as a city is before the citizens of Owen Sound and perhaps before the Legislature.
