## Everybody's Doing It.

East Grey's Popular Member the Subject of More Eulogies.  
In the Family Herald and Weekly Star of Montreal, under the caption of "Men and Women We Honor About," the writer of that department indulges in the following eulogistic reference to the Hon. J. B. Lucas, who has been considerably in the limelight during the past few weeks, owing to his masterly handling of the office of Provincial Treasurer, and the fact that he may be permanently appointed to that office at the close of the present session. The Family Herald-writer says:

"The Honorable Jean-Benoit Lucas, member of the Ontario Legislature for Centre-ree, who is acting as Provincial Treasurer since the death of Colonel Matheson, is a son of a pioneer of Ontario, although he has long since passed from the age of boyhood, being no less than forty-six years old. As he was born in the Confederation year he was thirty-one when he was first elected to the Legislature in 1898; but he might easily have been mistaken for a lad of eighteen then; and as a matter of fact to-day, with his smooth, round face, clear eye, and splendid head of sleek hair he could without any make-up take the part of a young man of twenty-two or so in any modern stage production."

Speaking of the Ontario Legislature, Mr. Lucas is an actor of an eminently dramatic type. He has a flexible, musical voice, which he controls with every trick and art known to the elocutionist; he has a most impressive delivery; and he puts his words, phrases and sentences together in such an apt manner that one is led to conclude that if he had any game in for law and politics he might have expounded a dramatic author. Practically from his youth Mr. Lucas has been an active and successful politician; having locally earned his nickname of "The Boy Orator" by stumping speaking during elections long before he became a candidate himself. He belongs to a family of zealous political workers. Mr. Alexander Lucas, the present member of the British Columbia Legislature for Yale, who previous to the going to the coast had been in Ontario, and in Calgary, West Alberta, is an elder brother. The Hon. J. B. Lucas was only fifteen when his elder brother ran in Lambton, but his youthful age did not prevent him from engaging actively in the canvass, and in successfully taking the stump against some of the veteran campaigners.
