Mr. John Cameron, late Reeve of Holland, has been appointed treasurer in place of Mr. Bresse, resigned.

Mr. Will Lyons has finished his first course in the Veterinary College, Toronto, and is now practising for the final exam.

The Markdale Junior Lacrosse Club, has been organized for the year 1888, under the name of Markdale Juniors, and the following officers were elected: Captain, Jas. Bush; Secy., Thomas; Jas. Matson; Field Com., R. Dismore, P. Duff, and W. Mathews.

The bottle trade to be eliminated from hotels.

Hours of sale to be shortened by prohibiting the opening of bars before 8 o'clock.

Shop license fees to be raised to same level as tavern licenses.

Restrictions to prevent storing of liquor in stables.

The above four proposals for the restriction of the liquor traffic were laid before the Ontario Legislature by Hon. W. J. Hanna on Wednesday night last, in the form of an amendment to the Liquor License Act. The amendments are the Governments recognition of the suggestions and propositions made for some time by the moderate-minded temperance men of the province, and will when put into force have a far-reaching effect in putting a stop to abuses that have given rise to an increasing demand for attention.—Mail.
