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### Rev. W. H. Adams Will Leave in June

On the Advice of His Physician Must Rest from Active Pastoral Work for a Year—His Departure Regretted.

The fourth quarterly meeting of this conference year was held last Sunday in the Methodist Church, the pastor, Rev. W. H. Adams, preaching morning and evening in his customary clear and appreciative manner to good sized and appreciative congregations. Sacrament was dispensed at close of the evening service.

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### Two Estimable Ladies. Gone to Their Reward

Mrs. John C. Henry and Mrs. Albert Jackson Pass Peacefully Away on Sunday.

A mantle of gloom was thrown over our village on Sunday last when the passing of Mrs. J. C. Henry and Mrs. Albert Jackson, which took place that morning, was announced from church pulpits. Both these persons had recently undergone surgical operations, and fatal results were not looked for, yet when both succumbed within a few hours of the same time the sadness was intensified. The two funerals took place on Tuesday, the former at 11 a.m. and the latter at 1:30 p.m. Service in both instances being held in the Methodist Church, and interment at Markdale Public Cemetery. Rev. W. H. Adams delivered very appropriate addresses. Just five months ago same day a similar funeral occurrence took place when the remains of the late John Lyons, Esq., and Mr. J. E. Boales were laid away.

### Refused Licenses to Meaford Hotels

Government Refuses to Renew Licenses in Meaford, but Gives Three Months to Sell Out.

Hon. W. J. Hanna, Provincial Secretary, has refused to grant licenses to the three hotels in Meaford this year. The action was as a complete surprise, both to the people of Meaford and those of the surrounding country. As a result of the removal of these licenses the riding of North Grey will be without a single hotel license.

It was not until Wednesday afternoon that Mr. James McLaughlin, chairman of the North Grey Board of License Commissioners, Inspector Beckett was notified of the intention of the Department. Each of these gentlemen received letters from Mr. Saunders, head of the License Dept., stating that the Minister had issued instructions that no licenses be granted this year. At a meeting of the Board two weeks ago the Meaford licenses were granted by the License Commissioners. Mr. Hanna's instructions were received only a day before May 1st, on which date new licenses take effect. It was then that the Board granted an extension of the old licenses for three months in order to allow the hotelkeepers to dispose of their stock of liquors.

In a letter to the Meaford Board and the Inspector, no assigned for not issuing the licenses, but it is understood that the Board was taken on account of the fact that the by-law was passed by only two-thirds of a vote against the by-law is still pending in the courts, and it is thought that after considering the conditions that Hon. Mr. Hanna decided that no licenses should be granted this year.

The Sudbury Star says:—The connecting link between the Algoma Eastern and the Canadian Northern railways has now been practically established and with the exception of some ballasting the work of construction is complete. This link gives the C.N.R. access to Manitoulin Island via the Algoma Eastern which is expected to be in running order about July 1st. In connection with the latter it may be mentioned that a fine new passenger engine arrived there on Sunday and is now at the A. E. round house where the company already has the nucleus of a working rolling stock. With the Algoma Eastern linked up to its existing and rapidly developing lines the Canadian Northern will have regained an entrance into Copper Cliff, Victoria Mines and Espanola, besides the splendid shipping facilities of the port of Little Current, and the trade of the Manitoulin Island. Until now the C.N.R. has largely been precluded from this very remunerative freight field. This augurs well for the Algoma Eastern, for it now becomes an integral part of a large system instead of depending solely on local service, thus assuring its future.

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### Distribution of Pure Bred Animals

By Department of Agriculture, Ottawa.

Realizing that inability to care for the use of well-bred animals is at the present time the greatest difficulty in the way of live stock improvement in many parts of Canada, the Dominion Department of Agriculture, through the Live Stock Branch, is this year undertaking a widespread distribution of pure bred stallions, bulls, rams and hogs. The original cost of these animals will be borne by the Government and they will be placed in the hands of such local organizations as agree to the conditions of the distribution. In a word, these sires will remain the property of the Department, but local associations will be responsible for their proper maintenance and management under the supervision of Officers of the Live Stock Branch. In the case of stallions, the members of the associations will also be required to pay a fee covering an annual premium.

All animals distributed will be bought from some breeder and will be Canadian bred. As heretofore possible, they will be purchased in the province in which they are to be placed. In this way Canadian breeders will receive encouragement and their market will be increased not only directly but indirectly through the emphasis given throughout the country to the value of pure bred sires. It may be added that it is not the intention to place the animals in districts where suitable male animals of the same class are already found by private individuals. The aim is rather to aid sections where pure bred sires are lacking and as well to encourage new communities in following a proper and intelligent system in breeding.

All bulls distributed will be purchased subject to the tuberculosis test and only stallions which have passed a rigid veterinary inspection for soundness will be selected. In order to take advantage of this form of assistance, it will be necessary for interested parties in any section to undertake the organization of a live stock association in whose hands such sires as are required may be placed. Complete information regarding the rules and regulations governing the distribution may be made upon application to the Live Stock Commissioner, Ottawa. Whenever possible, an Officer of the Branch will render assistance in the perfecting of the necessary local organization.

### C.P.A. on June 3 and 4

What will most assuredly be the largest gathering of newspaper publishers ever held in Canada will meet in Toronto on June 3 and 4 as the 55th annual convention of the Canadian Press Association. About 225 members attended the last annual meeting, held at Ottawa, but it is expected the attendance at this year's meeting will greatly exceed that number. A three-day excursion to the mining camps of Cobalt, South Porcupine and Timmins, and Algoma Park will be held at the close of the convention. Ladies will be included in the excursion party. Although the membership of the Canadian Press Association is now more than double what it was when the central office was established eight months ago, it has been decided to make a very special effort to greatly increase the next annual meeting.
